APPLE MARKETING

Government Will Purchase 25.000 Barrels To Be Shipped Overseas.

Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Sept. 24 .- Hon. John S. Martin, minister of agriculture for Ontario, today announced government assistance in the marketing of the apple crop of the province. The government will carry out an extensive publicity campaign urging the citizens to use home-grown fruit, and will aid in securing export markets by purchasing 25,000 barrels of representative apples to be shipped overseas with a view to favor-ably impressing the buyers there with the quality of the Ontario fruit. 
