Poincare's Reply to Ramsay MacDonald Paves Way to Co-operation.

London, Feb. 4.—The correspondence which passed recently between Ramsay MacDonald, the British premier, and M. Poincare the French premier, following a letter from Mr. MacDonald to M. Poincare advancing MacDonald to M. Poincare advancing the hope that France might adopt a conciliatory spirit toward Great Britain and that the two countries might resume full cordial relations was made public here yesterday. Mr. MacDonald's letter was dated January 26. It was typewritten and was handed to M. Poincare in the Chamber of Deputies while debate on the ber of Deputies while debate on the French government fiscal measures was beginning. Notwithstanding the confusion growing out of the debate M. Poincare wrote his reply by hand at the ministerial bench in the chamber and sent it within an hour to the foreign office in Paris, whence it was sent to London by the ordinit was sent to London by the ordinary post. 
