DISTRESSING ACCIDENT AT I. C. R. YARDS

Jeffrey Burke Has Arm Crushed
While Shunting

A distressing accident occurred
last Friday morning when a young
man named Jeffrey Burke of Sal-
mon Lake aged 23 had his arm
crushed while engaged in shunting
operations. It is thought that
while directing the shunter he was
swinging far out from the car and
was knocked under the wheels by
coming in contact with a disused
switch.

He was taken to the Hospital
where Dr. Pincus amputated the
arm two inches below the shoulder.
It is felt in circles here that the
I. C. R. are greatly at fault in not
having the crossing and yard at
Victoria Station properly lighted;
many of the citizens bitterly com-
plaining that the place is most
dangerous at the present time.

FUNERAL OF POLICE OFFICER HARRIS

The funeral of the late police
officer David Harris was held last
Saturday, and a large number of
citizens turned out to pay their
respects to the deceased officer.
Rev. T. P. Drumm conducted the
funeral service, and the pall-bearers
were: Chief Police Hughes, officers
Brown and Savie, Chief of the
Fire Brigade Christie and Messrs
Goss and Connell as representing
the Canadian Order of Foresters
of which society the deceased was
a member. He was comparatively
young man and leaves a widow
and four children.

SHIPPING SEA- SON CLOSES

Large Shipments of Lumber from
This Port

With the departure of the K.
M. S. Canada on Tuesday after-
noon on her fifty fourth trip for
Gaspé the shipping season may be
said to be practically over. The
government tug Canso left for St.
John last Saturday while the
dredge St. Lawrence will remain
here for the winter and make re-
quired repairs. All over the sea-
son has been a splendid one, no
fewer than fifty ocean going vessels
clearing from this port, represent-
ing a total of 52,500 tons of lumber
while one hundred and eleven
vessels cleared for coastwise
traffic carrying a tonnage of 32,127
tons a grand total up to the 16th.
November of 34,677 tons.

Reduction in Price of Cement

In November, 1910, it was an-
nounced that the price of Cement
had been reduced. That announce-
ment was admitted by many as
corroborative of the opinion that
the merging of the Cement inter-
ests in Canada would prove a
good thing for the public.

The theory of a consolidation
such as the Canada Cement Com-
pany is that the consolidated in-
terests are in a position to effect
economy in production and distri-
bution.

That the Canada Cement Com-
pany are working upon the idea
of increasing consumption by lower-
ing prices, rather than curtailing
production and obtaining higher
prices, is clearly shown by its
President's report to the share-
holders at the last Annual Meeting
when he stated: "It is confidently
expected that the increased de-
mand and increased output will
result in further savings in the
cost of manufacture and distribu-
tion, and it is the policy of your
Directors to give your customers
the benefit of these reductions."

This is further evidenced by the
announcement, which was made
on November 1st, 1911, of a still
further reduction in the price of
cement. The reduction in some
districts is 10c. per barrel, and in
others, 5c. On the whole it will
probably average 7c. per barrel.
This reduction—with the reduc-
tion made last year—means a
very large saving to the cement
consumers of Canada.

We trust that the expecta-
tions of lower cost voiced by the Pre-
sident of the Canada Ce-
ment Company, will be realized
again next year, so that the Com-
pany may continue its policy of
giving the benefit of these reduc-
tions to its customers—thereby
enlarging the uses to which Ce-
ment may be put.

to five months imprisonment with
hard labor in default of payment of
\$30 for fines and costs.
