

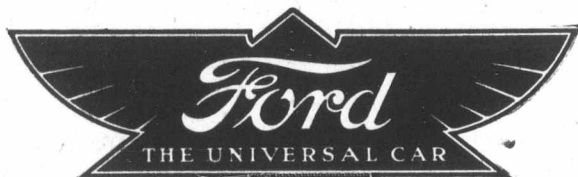

Address and Presentation

A very pleasant evening was spent at the home of Mr. and Mrs. John Saunders, 4th line, Warwick, when over 80 of the friends and neighbors met to do honor to Pte. Bert Saunders, who has enlisted for overseas service with Lambtons 149. Mr. A. Rush, acting in a very appropriate manner, presided as chairman. A program was then given of patriotic songs, speeches and instrumental music and selections on the gramophone which was supplied by Mr. Wm. Harper. At the end of the program Pte. Saunders was asked to take the floor when an address was read and he was presented with a beautiful signet ring and wrist watch with luminous dial. The following address was read by Miss Margaret Chambers and presentation made by Miss Viola McNaughton.

Watford, May 4, 1916,
To Mr. Bert Saunders,
Watford, Ont.

Dear Friend:—We, a number of your friends and neighbors, have gathered here to-night for the purpose of expressing our appreciation of the noble step which you have taken in answering the call of our King and country. Yet we admire your hearty response when duty calls and that we know you are not only fighting to defend your own home and dear ones but you are defending the homes and families of this community as well. But we trust that our Heavenly Father will guard and protect you and that you may have a safe and speedy return! We feel that we could not let you depart from among us without in some way expressing to you our esteem and good wishes in which you are held. We ask you to accept this ring and wrist watch, and as it ticks off the minutes may it ever remind you of your many friends at home.

Although taken by surprise, Pte. Saunders made a very feeling reply, thanking his many friends for their kindness to him. The ladies then took possession and served a very bountiful repast of sandwiches, cake and coffee, after which the pleasant evening came to a close by singing "For he's a jolly good fellow" and "God save the King."

Address and Presentation

On the evening of Thursday April 27th about 75 of the friends and neighbors of Pte. Cecil Sisson gathered at his home on the 6th line west Brooke, to spend an evening with him, prior to his departure for London. Mr. Melvin Kelly acted as chairman and an excellent program of songs, speeches etc. was rendered, at the conclusion of which Pte. Sisson was called forward and presented with a wrist watch and the following address. The address was read by Harold Leach and the presentation was made by Russel Shea.

TO CECIL SISSON:—Dear friend and schoolmate.—We, your friends and old schoolmates have gathered at your home to-night to spend a social evening with you before your departure from our midst to join your battalion at London. While we are sorry to miss your cheerful presence, we feel proud of you, the first of our boys to don the khaki and fight for King and Country. We honor you more than we can say for the sacrifice you are making in leaving your home and friends to fight for the cause of freedom and right, you take with you the good wishes of your many friends and our hope and prayer is that very soon you may return victorious with the kaiser satisfactorily disposed of, and with the consciousness that you have done your bit for your country. And now we would ask you to accept this

wrist watch as a slight token of the esteem in which you are held by your old friends and neighbors.

Pte. Sisson, though taken by surprise made a suitable reply. All joined in singing "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow" after which lunch was served. The young people then spent the time in playing games, and after wishing Pte. Sisson a safe return to his native land the evening was brought to a close by singing "God Save The King."

Route March

"C" Company Lambtons 149 left here Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock on a route march to Alvington and Inwood. There were 135 men in line, headed by the bugle band, and made a fine showing as they marched along the street. The strenuous military training of the past few weeks has made a big improvement in the men and their smart appearance was freely commented upon by the crowd who lined Main St. The Company was officered by Capt. Stapleford, Lieuts. Swift, White and Stokes, the first two named being mounted. On Wednesday they went from Alvington to Inwood. At both places they were entertained by the citizens and made as comfortable as conditions would permit. They return to Watford this (Thursday) afternoon and at the end of the week, or early next week, will march to Sarnia where they will remain about two weeks before mobilizing at London.
