THE COAL STRIKE COMMISSION. New York, March 6.-The Herald cent advance in the pay for mining to take effect at the time the miners re-turn to work last October. The day laborers will not have their wages increased, but will be recommended increased, but will be recommended for the same pay for a day of nine hours. The system of pay will be regulated, wherever practicable and the operators will be required to pay by weight instead of by the car and elsewhere by the lineal yard. The miners will have check docking representatives at their own expense. This will practically amount to a second increase in wages. There will be indirect recognition of the Union which will come when the findings are submitted by I'resident Roosevelt to John Mitchell, as President of the Miners' Union. The cause of the strike as found by the commission will not be comforting to the coal mining companies. The boycott will be condemned and the principle will be laid down that a miner has a right to work without molesta-

The terms of the verdict are to hold good for three years and recommendations are to be made for settlements of wage and other questions at the end of that period.
