

The left wing of the 76th Regt. embarked on board H. M. A. Brilliant and Pylades yesterday afternoon, and sailed shortly after for St. John, N. B.

Military Stores, have arrived here by Packet *Ada* from Halifax. Sixty tons of powder and 12 tons of shot have been landed, and the former conveyed to Fort Howe. Ten Artillerymen accompanied the ammunition. We believe considerable activity may be looked for in military matters here. It is said the fortifications are to be improved and strengthened, and other works in connection with defences commenced. A government landing stage is wanted at Partridge Island, and there is nothing of the sort at Fredericton. We believe the effect of Gen. Byre's visit will be to place us less under the influence of Halifax, the defences of which have been vastly improved, while ours are left in a state of comparative decrepitude.—*St. John Courier*.

The U. S. (2nd class) Frigate *Cyane*, 20, Captain Robb, from Eastport, bound to the coast of Newfoundland, arrived on Tuesday. She exchanged salutes with the citadel, and with the flag-ship in port.—*Col*.

On motion of Hon. M. B. Almon, Resolved—That it be certified that the subject of voting by proxy, will be taken into consideration at a Special General Meeting to be held in the month of October next, as near as convenient to the Annual Meeting of the Diocesan Church Society.

Mr. Almon also moved that the above Resolution and the following notices be published by the Executive Committee, and also a notice that any other Resolutions relating to the same subject and intended to be moved, shall be filed with the Secretary on or before the 25th of August next in order to be published.

1. Dr. King gave notice that the following Resolution will be moved and advocated at the Special General Meeting in October next.

"Resolved, That this meeting be authorized to make such regulations relative to voting by proxy as may be deemed expedient by the meeting."

2. Rev. L. Gilpin Jr. gave notice that at the same meeting he will move as follows:

"Resolved, That the right of voting by proxy be in no way interfered with or limited."

3. John C. Halliburton, Esq., gave notice that at the same Meeting he will move as follows:

"Resolved, That no Member of the Associate Alumni be authorized to hold more than three proxies."

4. C. B. Bowman, Esq. gave notice of his intention to move at the same Meeting that it be

"Resolved, That in all cases where the Executive Committee shall have considered a Subject to be discussed at any General Meeting, of such consequence as to require the special attention of the Members of the Corporation, and shall have given notice thereof in the Church Times at least three weeks immediately prior to such Meeting, all proxies to be used at such General Meeting shall specify the nature of the vote to be given on that subject; and on all other subjects which may come before the Meeting, the Members holding proxies, shall be at liberty to vote in such manner as they shall deem best, unless otherwise restricted by such proxies.
