FOUR NEW BOOKS

A SERVANT OF THE PUBLIC

By ANTHONY HOPE. Illustrated. 12mo, Cloth, \$1.50.

"Good wine needs no bush," and Anthony Hope's work needs no recommendation. This is particularly true of his delineation of modern social conditions. In this new novel, in which he analyses the relationship between the "Philistine" and the "artist," he shows in the lives of a famous actress and her friends the necessary effect of the occupation of the stage and temperament upon life and action. It is not the conventional novel of the theatre, but an unbiased study of the private life and personal emotions of a public character—showing not only how she seemed to the world outside her profession, but also how that profession made her what she was and inevitably ordered her life and actions.

THE FLIGHT OF GEORGIANA

By ROBERT NEILSON STEPHENS. Illustrated. Cloth, \$1.50.

A story of love and peril in England in 1746, just after the Battle of Culloden. The hero is a dashing young Jacobite officer, escaping for his life, whose courage, audacity and wit stand him in good stead in winning not only his liberty, but "Georgiana." A fascinating love-story, full of action and excitement, with situations of elemental and universal appeal.

THE GRAPPLE

By GRACE MACGOWAN COOKE. Cloth, \$1.50.

The story of a strike in the coal mines of Illinois, based on facts and giving both sides of the question of labor vs. capital. And it is, in addition, that most charming of all things, the love-story of people who have passed their early youth, yet whose devotion has but increased with adverse circumstances.

CAMERON OF LOCHIEL

By PROF. CHAS. G. D. ROBERTS. Cloth, \$1.50.

The publishers are gratified to announce a new edition of a book by this famous author, who may be called the Walter Scott of Canada. This interesting and valuable romance is fortunate in having for its translator Professor Roberts, who has caught perfectly the spirit of the original. The French edition first appeared under the title of "Les Anciens Canadiens" in 1862, and was later translated and appeared in an American edition now out of print.

Patriotism, devotion to the French-Canadian nationality, a just pride of race, and a loving memory for his people's romantic and heroic past, are the dominant chords struck by the author throughout the story, which begins during the old regime, and whose characters are active participants in the struggle which ended in the possession of Canada by the English.
