Description of rifle, Class I (S.); range, 400 yards; time, one minute; position, any. Conditions: Competitor, when called by register keeper, may load his rifle, he will then receive the word "commence," he will then fire as many shots as possible during the period of one minute when he will receive the word "cease fire." If a competitor should fire a shot after the word "cease fire," 5 points will be deducted for it from his score. After the expiration of one minute the target will be lowered and the value of the hits signalled from the marking trench. The register keeper will keep a tally on the firing ticket of the number of shots fired. Should the number of shots signalled exceed the number fired, then five points will be deducted for each shot in excess of number fired.

**THE PROVINCE OF QUEBEC LOTTERY!**

Another Fortune of \$15,000.00 won at the Province of Quebec Lottery.

Decidedly the series of the Capital Prize winners is opened. At the drawing of the 5th of August the Capital Prize was drawn by a carpenter of Weedon, Province of Quebec, Mr. Justinien Benoit.

At the drawing of the 19th August it was drawn by a gentleman of the Province of Ontario, Mr. N. D. McCallum, shipper for the firm of Wm. Caldwell, Carleton Place, County of Lanark. Mr. McCallum had much pleasure in delivering to the Lottery the following certificate:

Montreal, August 22nd, 1891.

"I the undersigned do hereby certify that I have drawn two prizes at the drawing of 19th instant of Province of Quebec Lottery, one of Fifteen Thousand Dollars and the other of fifteen dollars, and that on presentation of my tickets this day at the Head Office of the Lottery, I have been paid at once; the numbers of my tickets were 53,269 and 28,397."

Mr. McCallum's luck was not limited to a fortune, a double shuffle had to follow, and at that same drawing he drew a small prize of \$15, just about what to pay his travelling expenses.

However, it must be stated that this is not the first time that gentleman is in good luck. At the preceding drawing, on the 5th August, he had already won \$25 which he had the good idea of investing into Lottery Tickets for the drawing of the 19th, when as first stated, he won two other prizes, one of which amounting to \$15,000.00.

Mr. McCallum had never invested in lotteries but the Province of Quebec Lottery, and states that he is not tempted to invest elsewhere—Last winter he began purchasing tickets, with the following results:

The *Illustrated London News* contains a portrait and sketch of the career of the late Gen. Sir Alexander Macdonell, K. C. B., colonel commandant 2nd Battalion Prince Consort's Own Rifle Brigade, whose death occurred at Carshalton, Surrey, England, on April 30th. Sir Alexander Macdonell (Aberchaldy) was the eldest son of Mr. Hugh Macdonell, formerly an officer of the revolutionary war (King's Royal Regiment of New York), who, with his brother, Col. John Macdonell, the speaker of that parliament, represented the County of Glengarry in the first Legislature of Upper Canada, which assembled at Newark (now Niagara) on September 17th, 1792, and who was the first adjutant-general of the militia of Upper Canada. Leaving Canada in 1801 Mr. Hugh Macdonell, under the patronage of the Duke of Kent, the father of the Queen, achieved considerable distinction abroad, especially when acting as consul-general at Algiers during a most critical period, and his sons, the late Gen. Macdonell and Hugh Macdonell, C.B., C.M.G., Her Majesty's minister to the King of Denmark, rose to high preferment in the military and diplomatic services. When living in Glengarry the family resided in what was then known as Glengarry house, on the St. Lawrence, which was the first stone, and in its day the largest, house in Upper Canada, the ruins of which (it was destroyed in 1813, during the war) are still to be seen on what is now known as Stone House Point, midway between Cornwall and Lancaster. Sir Alexander was a first-cousin of Col. John Macdonell (Greenfield), Brock's A.D.C., and member for Glengarry, who was killed at Queenston Heights with Sir Isaac and the late Cols. Duncan and Donald Macdonell.
