

This treaty ought to be privately authorized by the council, and attested, where laid out, by two or three, or more, who are lawfully ordained to write, according to the written on the bills the place and occasion of the summe, and the person's name to whom the summe was paid, or is due, and to sign the said bills, and report and produce them in council within a month or farrer, after the said expence is levysed. And further finds, decons and declares, That the said extraordinary deacons of Crafty have no right to give their special vote and confutation, answering chusing and chusing the members of the said Extraordinary Council of Edinburgh; but that they have no right to elect the election of the officers of the Town'dam, the constables, and baillies of the publick places of the city, and their assistants, kirk and church masters, Rent-masters, and auditors of the town's accounts; nor in electing and chusing the baillies of the burghs, namely, the baillies of Canongate, Portsburgh, and Caltoun, the maister and counsill having the only right in electing the said officers. But finds, decons and declares, That the said extraordinary deacons have a right to be adjoined with the ordinary council, or least ought to be legally c' for that they are to proceed to the election of the baillies, deans of Kirk, or treasurers, or to let or any immunitie for such, about the yearly summe of Nineteen-and-euen, or to give benefices, which offices within the burghs, or to grant exemptions, contributions, amercias, and connecting subsidies; or to dispose of the comonalt good, exceeding the summe of Twenty pounds Scots together. And further finds, decons and attests, That the said extraordinary deacons have no right to give their votes in chusing committees for deliberating and managing all or any of the said matters, or to be capable of being members of the said committees, and as to the article of chusing officers for
