CHICAGO, Jan. 11.—Wheat came nearer to a panicky market today than at any time for months. There were many cases in which big houses with selling orders could not find buyers. The entire trade was semi-demoralized during a brief period with prices melting away fast, but a show of relative steadiness was finally brought about.

It was not until wheat values had broken down \$\frac{3}{4}\$ cents a bushel below the top notch war price reached a few days ago that frantic sellers could be forced to recognize that confirmation was lacking for stories that the Dardanelles fortifications were at the point of surrender and that as a result the world would be flooded with Russian wheat. The fact remained that bearish sentiment had acquired immense impetus owing to recent threats of call for government interference because of threats of six cent bread and in consequence of the possibility that hostilities by Italy, Roumania and Greece would mean a stop to the war sooner than had been generally expected.
