of his Affairs, his Actions will testify the Truth of these Observations.

Greece was divided into feveral States, the chief Strength of which confisted in their Union; as the Power of England, and its Allies, subsists by that indissoluble Connection of Treaty.

The King of *Macedon* was a common Enemy to them all in general, and equally endeavoured to supplant the whole, by formenting Divisions or acting Hostilities against some, and laying others asleep with salse Professions of Amity and Alliance. He quickly perceived the *Athenians* were the only People capable of putting a Stop to his Designs; and upon attempting to cross *Thermopylae*, he found himself effectually retarded by a Fleet and Army ready posted to guard that important Passage.

THE Straits of Thermopylæ were the Barrier between Thebes and Macedonia, as the Flemish Towns were the Barrier of Holland and France; and it behoved as much the Athenians to inspect the Motions of Philip, as it does England to have a watchful Eye over France and its Adherents.

A Cessation of Arms was concluded on by both Sides, and a Treaty was ratisfied, which carried
