

Warr, the respected Incumbent of St. Saviour's Church, and formerly the Missionary at Oakville, in this diocese. He was very much surprised, though pleased, to see me, and invited me to spend the day with him, and to accompany him to his church.

In the afternoon I visited his Sunday schools, and addressed the children, before they were dismissed, at his request. Mr. Warr is a hard-working and justly popular clergyman, and possesses a large amount of influence in Liverpool and its vicinity. He is, moreover, the Organizing Secretary of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel in Foreign Parts, for the Archdeaconry of Liverpool; and the returns of that Venerable Society show how thoroughly his heart is in the work, and how ably his duties in that capacity are discharged.

Monday, 25th.—I remained with Mr. Warr, to afford myself an opportunity of laying the object of my Mission before him, to take his counsel, and thus to prepare the way for my future visit to Liverpool. He entered heartily into the subject, and promised me in the kindest manner his hearty co-operation.

Tuesday, 26th.—I took my departure at 9 o'clock, by the London and North-Western Railway, for Nuneaton, in Warwickshire, midway between Liverpool and London, where I had arranged to spend a day with my old and valued friend, Dr. Mackie, formerly Official to the late Bishop of Quebec, but now Vicar of Chilvers Coton. He met me at the station, and accompanied me to his Vicarage, where I was warmly received by Mrs. Mackie and himself.

Having taken a severe cold in Liverpool, I found it prudent to nurse myself for a short time, and therefore I remained with my kind friends until Thursday, the 28th, on which day I proceeded to London, where I arrived at 4 o'clock.

The weather being very cold and wet, the exposure increased my cold, so that at bed time my voice was completely gone. This gave me a good deal of uneasiness, for I feared that it might be a return of the attack from which I suffered a few years ago.

Friday, 29th.—By the application of severe remedies, I found my cold better this morning, and my voice partially restored. This enabled me to go in quest of lodgings, which I found it necessary to do, before I entered upon the duties of my Mission.
