## MINGLES MIRTH WITH SINGLE TAX ARGUMENTS

Joseph Fels Has Little Tiff With Mayor at Unusually Large Empire Club Dinner.

Joseph Fels speculated on the possibility of being able to say "Ladies and gentlemen," when next he addressed the Empire Club, in opening his address to the club yesterday, but there was no applause. So he plunged into the single tax question at once, with his dog illustration.

"If you want to abolish dogs, you put a tax on dogs, say a 20 tax, and then the dogs disappear. At this juncture of dinner, I won't say where they would disappear to, but they would disappear." His point was that it does not encourage the existence of anything to put a tax on it.

If it is desired to promote building, machinery, industry, the way to do it is to take the taxes off these things. Mr. Fels gave an illustration from Elkhart, Indiana, where a manufacturer was invited to establish a factory on the terms of offering to build the factory on five acres of land and giving the manufacturer, Geo. A. Briggs, a deed for these, with freedom from taxes for five years. As the town with 10,000 people had no money, the difficulty was to find the means to build the factory costing \$50,000 or so. Some of the leading men got together and quietly bought 200 acres next to the five acres, and they guaranteed the \$50,000. After the factory was established, the land jumped in value from \$100 to \$1200 an acre, and the guarantors got their money back many times over.

Mr. Fels asserted that one-third of the land in Toronto had never known the tickle of a spade since the farmer owned it. He had read in the paper that morning of seventeen people living in one room.

A Voice—"Fourteen."

"Well, that's as near as a drummer can come to the truth," he laughed. Mr. Fels ridiculed the idea of the city advertising for manufacturers.

"I know it. That's why I am so frank." If the city took the taxes off buildings and put them on land, the city would have more factories than they would know what to do with.

"I am not the Mayor."

"If I was mayor, I would correct the job in thirty days," asserted Mr. Fels, speaking of the Street Railway Company.

"How would you do it?" asked some one.

"My dear sir, I am not the mayor," was the reply, amid a roar of laughter. He recommended the mayor to read Tom L. Johnson's last book, and offered to raise a subscription to buy him one.

Mayor Geary took umbrage at this and said he could buy his own books. Another gentleman said the question had not been fairly met, and some feeling arose in the meeting. The chairman ruled that it was not a debate, but an address and there should be no interruptions. Mr. Fels asserted that if the terms of the street railway bill were broken, the franchise should be forfeited and proceedings should be taken to forfeit it. (Applause.)

"I want here to apologize to the mayor for my levity. I have no right to slight any one, but in my exuberance of joy at finding three single tax months ago, I may have uttered a little levity." The mayor admitted his mollification.

Mr. Fels discussed the Sikh question and declared the action taken in excluding their wives to be treason to the King and empire. They sang their loyalty to the King there, but they refused to recognize the principles of patriotism and loyalty in the person of their fellow subjects.

"I spouted 125 times in two months and pretty nearly spouted the few brains the good Lord had given me," he said when asked for some single tax facts, and he related the experience of Edmonton and Vancouver under single tax conditions.

"I am aware I have hoodooed myself in closing. There were cries of 'No, no.' 'It's all right,' he added, 'I'd rather have a row than eat.'

"It's coming, and it's coming fast. It's coming in England, and as Britain flutters to-day, the world dances to-morrow," was his final prophecy of the single tax.

Mr. Fels corrected some statements made by the newspapers attributing him in the report of some remarks on the McNamara case. Taking all the facts into consideration, he believed that the men were not murderers.

"That is nonsense," said some one. "Very well, if I am wrong, my argument falls to the ground. You men do not know all the conditions that surrounded that thing in Los Angeles."

The sentence, he said, was engineered between the judges and the attorney. Mr. Fels renewed his offer to duplicate up to \$100,000 any subscriptions made by the local merchants for the purpose of abolishing the business tax meeting was one of the largest ever held by the club, several hundreds being present.

### GOVERNMENT CAN'T PROSECUTE

The Toronto District Labor Council say that the alien labor law, as contained in the statutes at the present time, is nothing less than a farce. A letter was sent to the department of labor in Ottawa some time ago, asking them to look into the matter of the alleged, are importing their labor from the United States.

At last night's meeting of the council a reply was received from Ottawa to the effect that the Labor Council could bring an action against the Swift Canadian Company, providing they had the permission of the attorney-general, and further, that the Dominion Government had no power to prosecute in such cases.

### DYNAMITERS IN PUEBLO.

PUEBLO, Colo., Jan. 19.—(Can. Press).—A terrific dynamite explosion early to-day partly wrecked the Colorado Laundry, in the heart of the business district of this city, and damaged the office of the Globe Express Co. The city detectives, who immediately began an investigation, found a dynamite fuse in the alley outside the express office.

### Nunnery Burned.

MONTREAL, Jan. 18.—The destroyed St. Ann's Nunnery at St. Jacques, L'Acadie near here this morning, had no losses of \$50,000, partly covered by insurance.

### LUMBERJACK LEARNS WHAT HAPPENED TO HIM

Joseph Charbonnet, the French-Canadian lumberjack, whose skull was crushed by a falling tree at Wabowag Falls on the Mistigash River, a week ago, and who was driven 15 miles thru the bush in a desperate effort to save his life, was sitting up in his cot in the General Hospital yesterday, reading in a newspaper the account of the saving of his life. It was his first knowledge of his rash trip to the city from the forest, which, with the skill of the surgeons who performed a difficult operation, removing four square inches of his skull, had saved his life, for until it was all over, he was unconscious.

### SPENCE GOES BACK AND OTHERS AHEAD IN COUNT

At 10 o'clock yesterday morning Judge Winchester resumed the recount of the board of control balloting, and as was the case with the videotape, it was found that a large majority of the returns sent in to the city clerk were wrong. So far only thirty-six subdivisions, in ward six have been counted, and the result thus far indicates that Ex-Controller Ward has gained 17 votes. Controller Church and Foster seven votes each, Controllers McCarthy and Hocken four votes, Candidates Sweeney and O'Donoghue are unchanged, while Ex-Controller Spence has lost two.

The returns for subdivision 32 were particularly erratic, for the recount showed that Ex-Controller Ward should have been credited with 10 more votes, and the others from two to five more than the original figures.

### BLOODY BATTLE IN ECUADOR

One Thousand Killed and Wounded—Montero's Army Defeated.

GUAYAQUIL, Ecuador, Jan. 19.—(Can. Press).—Over 1000 men were killed and wounded in a battle yesterday at Yaguache, to the northeast of this city.

An army supporting the Quito Government, under the command of Gen. Julio Andrade, formerly Ecuadorian minister to Colombia, attacked and defeated an army of Guayaquil troops, supporting the provisional government proclaimed by Gen. Montero, Gen. Flavio Alfaro, in command, was wounded.

### COTTON STRIKE SETTLED.

MANCHESTER, Eng., Jan. 19.—(Can. Press).—The dispute in the cotton trade, which culminated in a lockout affecting about 200,000 men on Dec. 27, has been settled.

The question at issue between employers and workers was the employment of non-unionist labor.

All the mills will be reopened on Monday.

### Burned in Firehall.

KENORA, Ont., Jan. 19.—(Can. Press).—Charles Nelson, a fireman in the service of the Canadian Pacific Railway, was burned to death this morning in a configuration which completely destroyed the local fire hall. The horses of the fire department, four in number, were burned, and the occupants of the building, all of whom were asleep when the flames broke out, had a narrow escape.

Nelson had been arrested earlier for threatening to shoot up the town. He had no relatives in this country.

### THREE THOUSAND PEOPLE MUST USE CIVIC LINES

According to the figures of Engineer E. L. Cousins, the St. Clair-ave. and Gerrard-st. civic car lines will involve an expenditure for operating equipment and construction work of \$312,551.20. The annual operating and maintenance expenses will amount to \$217,755. To pay expenses, Mr. Cousins figures that these two lines must carry 1,832,725 passengers annually at a rate cent fare.

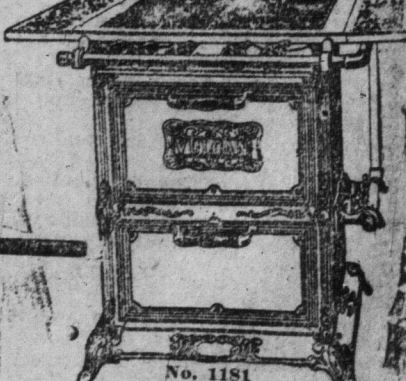
