TWO FIREMEN INJURED WHEN BROCKTON TRUCK WAS STRUCK BY A CAR

Lieutenant Harry Hamilton May Die, and Driver Charles Irwin is in a Serious Condition From Injuries Received at College and Dufferin Streets—Rumor That Motorman Has Disappeared

Colliding with terrific force, an east-bound College car, running at 20 miles an hour, crashed into a northbound hose wagon at Dufferin and College streets last night. Lieut. Harry Hamilton and Driver George Irwin of Brockton fire hall were seriously injured, and Hamilton is not expected to live many hours. Thrown several yards and landing on the pavement he sustained a fracture at the base of the skull, a broken nose and a deep gash above the left eye. Irwin has a compound fracture of the elbow and was badly bruised. Both were taken to the Parkdale Hospital, 71 Melbourne ave.

Motorman No. 1628, who operated the car, cannot be located by the police of No. 7 Division, in which the accident occurred. Following the collision his number was taken, but not his name. At midnight the police informed The World that the motorman had disappeared.

Boy Heard the Bell.

As the hose wagon with Hamilton and Irwin on the driver's seat and Wm. Swan on the rear standing board, was drawn by galloping horses north on Dufferin street en route to a fire in Wyckwood, the car was advancing at a rapid rate along College street east-bound. There was no slackening of the rate of the street car nor of the hose wagon. The going of a fire apparatus is the signal for all traffic to come to a standstill, but whether motorman 1628 heard the alarm is uncertain. It is said that a small boy named Freeman, hearing the gong, pulled the bell rope before Dufferin street was reached.

TRAINS COLLIDE FIREMAN KILLED

Several Passengers Slightly Injured in Grand Trunk Railway Wreck at Parkhill.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—(Can. Press).—Fireman H. R. Scott of Stratford was killed and several persons injured when two G. T. R. trains collided at Park Hill tonight. Mixed train No. 72, east-bound, had partly backed into the switch to allow a thru log train to pass, when the latter ran into her. Engineers Farr and Whitting were on the two engines hauling the mixed train, and escaped injury by jumping. The compound locomotive hauling the freight, was derailed and otherwise damaged.

Mrs. D. M. McLeod of Parkhill was slightly injured when thrown against a seat. A car of apples in the mixed train was smashed against the engine tender, and one animal in a car of cattle was killed.

Toronto trains Nos. 5 and 7, were sent around by way of London while the line was blocked.

Parents, Not Teachers to Blame.

BRANTFORD, Oct. 17.—(Special).—Principal W. N. Bell of Paris, president of Brant Teachers' Association, at the annual convention here today declared that the average age 12-13 years, of successful entrance candidates, was too high, and that the fault was with the parents and not with the teachers. He advocated home work and a stricter supervision by parents over all the pupils, which would result in great economy in the present public school educational system.

CRUSHED BY FREIGHT CARS

William Sowerby Was Fatally Injured While at Work in Union Station Yards.

William Sowerby, a trainman, living at 197 Sumach street, was fatally injured in the Union Station yards yesterday afternoon. While coupling two freight cars, he slipped and was thrown on the track, his head being crushed.

He was rushed to Grace Hospital in the Ellis' motor ambulance, but died a few moments after admission. Coroner Dr. Cotton will open an inquest today.

RUSHING TROOPS TO CRUSH DIAZ

Insurgent Leader Said to Be Gaining Strength, But Madero is Contentious.

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 17.—(Can. Press).—A train load of troops from the State of Morelos reached the capital last night and will reinforce Gen. Beltrán in the campaign against Diaz. The day before the fall of Vera Cruz, the legislature of the State of Morelos formally protested to the central government against the weakness of the federal forces in that state, and requested reinforcements in view of the increased number of Zapatista bands operating there.

The government, however, has been determined to throw all its power against Diaz. Gen. Diaz is said to be gaining strength in the coast country, and it is believed will make an effort to occupy the port of Tampico, although early advice does not indicate a formal movement towards the interior.

President Madero and his ministers persist in minimizing the importance of the revolt and express the opinion that Gen. Diaz will never get out of the State of Vera Cruz.

For This Reason, Temperance Forces of Riding Refuse to Endorse William Sutherland, Independent Candidate—Blue Ribbon Say Nominee is Not Real Cold-Water Advocate.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—(Canadian Press).—The temperance electors of Middlesex this afternoon declined to endorse William Sutherland, the independent candidate in the by-election, despite his acceptance of the "abolish the bar" platform. Neither candidate will be endorsed.

Frank Whitehall spoke of an interview with Mr. Sutherland regarding his attitude, and the candidate admitted he was not a teetotaler and refused to commit himself on the abolition of the bar.

SERVIA AND BULGARIA DECLARE WAR ON TURKEY FIGHTING TO BE SHARP

Streets of Belgrade Scene of Wild Enthusiasm Following Formal Declaration in Answer to the Porte—Greeks Gain Naval Victory in Preveza Strait—Brief Campaign Likely.

GREECE DECLARES WAR.

ATHENS, Oct. 17.—(Can. Press).—2.30 a.m.—Greece, not wishing to detach herself from her allies, sent instructions early this morning to the minister at Constantinople to communicate a declaration of the war to the Porte. Greece at the same time sent a fraternal greeting to the allied states.

Servia and Bulgaria declared war last night. The official declaration of war deprives Greece of the services of a Chinese cruiser she had arranged to purchase at Newcastle, as she has been obliged to abandon the purchase for fear of diplomatic complications. Four destroyers which Greece purchased at Liverpool shipped naval crews at Algiers and have since been sent to the Gulf of Arta and secure a supply of stores to the army of Epirus.

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Bulgaria's Proclamation Today. SOFIA, Bulgaria, Oct. 17.—(Can. Press).—King Ferdinand is on his way to the headquarters of the Bulgarian army near the Turkish frontier. The king's manifesto to the people of Bulgaria, which will be published tomorrow, will be published tomorrow. A special service will be held in the cathedral when the archbishop will invoke a blessing on the holy war on which the country is embarking. Similar services will be held throughout the country.

Premier Guechev issued a statement today on the attitude of Turkey, saying: "With pride which it lacerates with the miserable role she plays in the European concert, Turkey has just declared that the identical note of the Balkan states does not merit an answer."

The premier characterized this as comical in view of Lord Salisbury's declaration of Turkey at the Berlin conference as "a power dependent upon the protection of others for its existence," and adds: "Turkey also accuses the Balkan states of lacking deference to the great powers. It is ridiculous that a government which since the Crimean war has done nothing but undermine the Balkan states if they succeed in great powers upon whose protection it depends should accuse us of failure to show respect for its protectors."

"MASSACRES IMMINENT." CONSTANTINOPLE, Oct. 17.—(Can. Press).—The council of ministers were still engaged today in debating on the attitude of Turkey toward Greece. The Turkish troops on the Bulgarian and Servian frontiers received orders last night to take the offensive, and, according to official information, large numbers of Pomaks, fanatical tribes of Mussulman Bulgarians who in past times have massacred Christian Bulgarians wholesale, crossed the frontier at Kirodoli, about forty miles to the west of Mustafa Pacha, penetrating several miles into Bulgarian territory, the Bulgarians retreating.

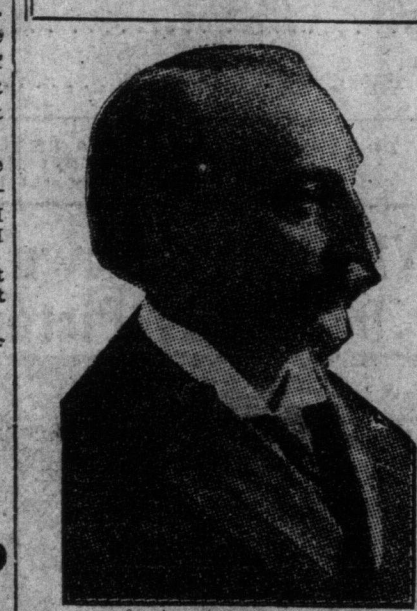
All reports received here indicate that serious fighting is proceeding at various points, including the district north of Gusline.

LONDON, Oct. 17.—(C. A. P.).—Edward Davidson, C.M.G., governor of the Seychelles since 1904, has been appointed governor and commander-in-chief of Newfoundland in succession to Ralph Williams, who is to retire on Feb. 3.

HON. F.D. MONK HAS RESIGNED BECAUSE OF STAND ON NAVY BUT RETAINS SEAT IN HOUSE

He Is Earnest and Insistent in His Opinion That No Assistance Should Be Given Without Referring the Whole Question to the People of Dominion.



Hon. F. D. Monk's resignation as minister of public works will be handed in in a day or two.

ROOSEVELT STILL IN THE ZONE OF DANGER

Anxious Family and Physicians Fear Blood Poisoning or Lockjaw May Yet Develop—John Mitchell and Lord Roberts Send Messages of Deep Concern.

CHICAGO, Oct. 17.—(Can. Press).—Throughout a day of unbroken calm, Col. Roosevelt lay in his bed in Mercy Hospital with virtually no variation of his condition. It was a day of waiting, with the ever present possibility of complications, but with lessened fears on the part of those who are watching over the wounded man. He seemed in his almost normal condition, but there was no relaxation in the strict regime, and his physicians said that he was by no means out of danger.

Col. Roosevelt's physicians were discussing tonight the length of time it will be necessary for the colonel to remain in the hospital. It was thought it might be safe for him to leave for Oyster Bay on Monday or Tuesday if all goes well, but not even a tentative decision was reached.

The clinical records were the most encouraging of any day since Col. Roosevelt entered the hospital. During the morning the variation in temperature was limited to two-tenths of a degree, and throughout the afternoon it was reported as normal. There was virtually no variation in the pulse.

Still Fear Lockjaw. Possibility of tetanus or "lockjaw" always to be reckoned with in the case of bullet wounds, has still to be considered and as the period in which this might develop, the physicians said, is six or seven days. Col. Roosevelt will not be regarded as entirely out of danger even should the next day pass with no signs of blood poisoning. Dr. Scurry Terrell said that the colonel could not leave the hospital safely until the expiration of this period, and for that reason it was regarded as out of the question to consider the colonel's departure for Oyster Bay before early next week.

Two callers on Col. Roosevelt today were twins, Joseph and Francis Walshe, who were born just as Col. Roosevelt was being brought into the hospital Tuesday morning.

Mrs. D. F. Walshe of Chicago, their mother, sent them down to "interview" the colonel. Their method was to cry lustily as each was taken on his left arm.

"They are good bull moose timber," smiled Col. Roosevelt; to the nurses; "they aren't afraid to voice their protest against a situation or condition they believe unjust. Congratulate their mother for me."

Mrs. Roosevelt gave the babies a motherly pat as they were being taken back to their mother.

He Is Earnest and Insistent in His Opinion That No Assistance Should Be Given Without Referring the Whole Question to the People of Dominion.

TO GIVE GOVERNMENT INDEPENDENT SUPPORT

Strong Pressure Is Being Brought to Bear on Him to Continue His Connection in the Cabinet, and Some of His Friends Hope He Will Change His Views and Stick With the Government—Emergency Contribution for the Navy May Be \$30,000,000.

OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—(Special).—There is no longer any doubt about Mr. Monk's resignation from the cabinet. While his resignation is not yet in the hands of Premier Borden, it will be in a day or two, and that it will be accepted can be definitely and authoritatively stated tonight.

It is understood that the reason for Mr. Monk's resignation is because of his stand on the navy question. He is convinced that the situation which confronts the empire is grave, and even critical. But he is earnest and insistent in his opinion that no assistance should be given by Canada, even as an emergency contribution, without referring the question to the people. There is reason for the belief that this latter view is not held by his colleagues.

Will Retain Seat in the House. It is thought that while Mr. Monk will resign from the cabinet he will retain his seat in the house and give the government independent support.

Strong pressure is being brought to bear upon Mr. Monk by influential friends in Montreal to continue his connection in the cabinet, and there is yet hope among his friends that he will change his views and stick with the government.

Emergency Contribution \$30,000,000. The general impression here now is that Premier Borden's naval program will consist of an emergency contribution of \$30,000,000.

Mr. Nantel Retains His Place. The authoritative announcement tonight of Mr. Monk's resignation, which his colleagues on the naval question and of his insistence upon a plebiscite as a condition precedent to the emergency contribution by Canada to the imperial navy, confirms the reports which have been persistent for some days past. It justifies the inference, however, that Mr. Nantel will retain his place in the government. There has never been any question as to Mr. Pelletier's position.

Mr. Marchal was here today, accompanied by Mr. Coderre, M.P. for Hochelaga, and there is little doubt but that Mr. Marchal is to enter parliament and the government at an early date.

Portfolio Not Congenial. Although Mr. Monk is retiring because of difference of opinion upon the naval issue, there is reason to believe that the public works portfolio has never been congenial to him. It is said that some of his recommendations were ignored by the cabinet and that some of his colleagues protested that the political end of the big department of public works was not being well handled. Mr. Monk is an able and conscientious man, of sensitive temperament and he would have retired from office some time ago had he consulted his personal inclination.

The Talk of Montreal. MONTREAL, Oct. 17.—(Special).—The coming resignation of Hon. F. D. Monk is now the talk of the town, although a strong sentiment against the action of the minister of public works has developed among the rank and file of the Conservative party. As a matter of fact, none of the old Conservatives wanted the minister to throw up the sponge, Mr. Bourassa alone being the one factor favoring a shirking of the responsibility which was forced upon the leader from this district.

Friendly Relations. It is understood that Premier Borden accepted the minister's resignation this afternoon. The relations between these two gentlemen are friendly. Mr. Monk realizes the absolute necessity of an urgency vote, but after pledging himself to the people in a contrary sense, he did not care to face the responsibility. Thus the minister of public works is undone and he may blame Mr. Bourassa for it all. There is every probability that Mr. Thomas Chase Casgrain will be Mr. Monk's successor in the cabinet, running for Hochelaga to be vacated by the appointment of Mr. Louis Coderre to the bench.

Rumor Is Busy. OTTAWA, Oct. 17.—(Special).—Rumor with many tongues is busy in Ottawa tonight. She has much to say of Hon. F. D. Monk's resignation from the cabinet, and of his resignation from the government. All agree that Mr. Borden did not ask for the resignation. Mr. Borden likes and respects Mr. Monk, and Mr. Monk, a gentleman by birth and education, has a personal loyalty to his chief. If Mr. Monk has resigned, it is
