THIRTY MILLION DOLLARS

Is the Amount Claimed From Spain Growing Out of the Insurrection Washington, March 27.-The Spanish War Claims Commission, of which former Senator William E. Chandler of New Hampshire is president, has received from the State Department a full list of the claims against Spain, growing out of the insurrection in Cuba, which were filed in the department up to the 15th of the present month. These claims are all those of American citizens, for, under the Treaty of Panis, the Governments of the United States and Spain undertook to adjust the claims of their own citizens. The grand total of these claims is about \$30,000,000, and included in the list are five claims in excess of a million dollars. Mrs. Ruiz, widow of the dentist who was killed in Havana prison, is a claimant for \$75,000. The largest single claim is that of John W.
