Cape Town, March 27.—The preparations for the state funeral of Cecil Rhodes, which will take place here April 2, are already in progress. Plans are half-masted everywhere. Those who attended the funeral of Mr. Rhodes say he continually sorrowed over the fact that he left so much unaccomplished. "So little done, so much to do," was an expression which he used more than once.

MARK OF RESPECT.

London, March 27.—The Rhodesian section of the Colonial Exposition at the Royal Exchange has been draped in black. Numerous expressions of regret and condolence have been sent by members of the Stock Exchange and others interested in South Africa. After a slight hesitation at the opening of the Stock Exchange the tone of Kaffirs was distinctly firmer, showing that Mr. Rhodes' death had been discounted.

WHERE THE HURONIAN WAS LOST.

St. John's Nfld., March 27.—The sealing steamer Harlow arrived in the channel last night with 12,000 seals aboard. A furious northeast gale has been raging for the last 36 hours, and it is feared that it will cause disaster among the sealing fleet anchored in the bay. The steamer Algine, having on board 3000 seals, was forced to seek shelter at Little Sand, owing to the violence of the storm. The sealing steamer Leopard, which has just arrived here reports a terrible weather. The steamer Newport, which has reached Placentia, she had no seals on board. Vessels which have arrived here from Europe with cargoes of salt report vast ice floes off the Virgin Rocks and the Grand Banks, and directly in the track of Atlantic shipping. The presence of ice in that locality is regarded as confirmation of the belief that the missing Allan Line Huronian was lost there.

DROWNED IN A FLOOD.
