and to lease or otherwise dispose of sa works and powers; with power to acqui by purchase, expropriation or otherwise lands, for the purposes of the Compand and to dispose thereof, to levy and colletolis, to take, use and dispose of water the purposes of said canals, for irrigating purposes, and for generating hydraulic other powers, and to transmit and dispose of the same, and to do all other acts necessary or incidental to the carrying out of the company's undertaking.
