EDWARD BLAKE

Baseless Story Regarding His Leaving the Nationalist Party Denied.

London, March 7.—The story regarding Hon. Edward Blake, which was

cabled to a Montreal paper on Feb. 20, to the effect that he was returning to take part in Canadian public life, is altogether devoid of foundation.

Mr. Blake is not leaving the Nationalist party; he has not fixed a time for a permanent return to Canada; he has no appeals from Canadian Liberals to return to Canada for the purpose of "reorganizing the Liberal party."

A SECESSION

Lord Claude John Hamilton Leaves the Conservative Party.

London, March 7.—Lord Claude John Hamilton, chairman of the Great Eastern Railway, and brother of Lord George Hamilton, secretary of state for India, has ruffled the political waters by suddenly seceding from the Conservative party.

In an open letter of explanation he asserts that while the foreign and colonial policy of the government has his entire approval, his fiscal policy, home legislation and

continued attacks upon property and capital are "beneath contempt." Therefore, he says, he can no longer support the administration. Lord Claude Hamilton, who is the second son of the first Duke of Abercorn and Lady Louisa Russell, the second daughter of the Duke of Bedford, represented London in the Conservative interest in the House of Commons from 1855; King's Lynn from 1859 to 1880, and Liverpool from 1880 to 1888. In 1888 he was a lord of the treasury.

As chairman of one of the principal railway companies his secession was largely dictated by opposition to the automatic couplings bill, which involves what he considers a superfluous capital expenditure on railways. Nevertheless, his action is very disagreeable to the government.

The Standard, commenting editorially upon the secession of Lord Claude Hamilton from the Conservative party, says: "It cannot be denied that he gives expression to a sentiment which does exist among a section of Lord Salisbury's followers."
