In brief. Mr. Maury comes out for a combined river water and spring water

He does not favor the Komoka tcheme.

As to the Titus scheme, he says, that through lack of data he is unable to recommend it to the commissioners. He also deals with the Lake Erie and Lake Huron schemes, both of which are out of the question, because of the tremendous cost.

Reports are made as to bringing water from Lakeside and St. Marys, but neither is deemed feasible.

In a supplementary report, Mr. Maury says he considers meters could not be profitably installed by the city. The cost would be very great.

The commissioners at the meeting last night, did not put themselves on record as favoring any scheme, though Mr. Saunders came out strongly in the debate for the Komoka plan.

The combined river and spring scheme would cost \$429,000, upon which the annual interest and sinking fund would be \$24,908 11. The scheme contemplates the col-

In referring to his combined river water and springs water scheme which he recommends to the city, Expert Maury has something to say regarding the exactions of the Canadian Underwriters' Association in order that the key rate of insurance here might be

He points out that the underwriters have suggested the installation of a separate fire fighting plant of three 3,000,000-gallon units, with separate mains, etc., with 200 pounds pressure at the hydrants.

"These requirements for a city of 45,000 inhabitants," Mr. Maury says, "with only one building six stories high, are so manifestly unreasonable that it is hard to believe that the underwriters really expected that they would be complied with. If they were not complied with, the inference was that the rates would not be reduced. That these requirements should be made at all seems to confirm the suspicions already prevalent among those who have given serious study to the matter, that recent advances in insurance rates all over Canada and the United States have been made less with regard to the real merits of the particular case than from a desire to recoup as quickly as possible the fire losses at Baltimore and San Francisco."

In conclusion, Mr. Maury says that he has had occasions to look into the requirements of the underwriters in several cities in America recently, and nowhere did he find anything which displayed the unreasonableness of the exactions imposed upon London.
