Big Meeting on Saturday Night

Heard Addresses By Prominent Speakers.

Niagara power was discussed at great length in the city hall on Saturday night, when Hon. Adam Beck, of London; Mr. W. K. McNaught, M. P., Toronto, and Mr. P. W. Ellis, of Toronto, delivered addresses on the subject. There was a large attendance. Ald. Gillean was chairman.

Ald. Matthews was the first speaker, and represented the Western Ontario Municipalities Niagara Power Union. He spoke in favor of the bylaw, and declared that when he is mayor of the city he will do his best to further the interests of Niagara power.

Mr. W. K. McNaught, M. P., followed. He paid a tribute to the work of Mr. Beck on the power commission. He then went into a lengthy exposition of the power scheme. He declared that the question was not a political one, and that all through the deliberations of the commission, politics had been religiously eschewed. It was possible, he declared, to develop 6,000,000 horsepower in Ontario—more than sufficient to run all the manufactures of England and Ireland, and still leave 1,000,000 horsepower for other purposes. When electricity supplants soft coal for generating light and power, there will be \$11,000,000 saved to the country every year that now goes to a foreign country for soft coal. The Niagara power scheme would give cheap lighting and better lighting, and therefore every man was interested in the subject.

Mr. P. W. Ellis was the next speaker. He made mention of the efforts made by the monopolists to defeat the Beck bylaw. The commission had spent a great deal of time on this subject, and had given it a thoroughness of consideration that is seldom given to a private enterprise. He referred to London's position as a manufacturing center, and declared it would be greatly increased by the incoming of Niagara power.

Hon. Adam Beck was the last speaker, and he devoted his time to discussing the circular issued by the "Taxpayers' Union." He declared it to be misleading, and that it was issued at the instigation of the power companies.

The meeting broke up at 11:15 o'clock with cheers for the speakers.

ANNIVERSARY FESTIVAL

Of the Memorial Church Sunday School Held Thursday Night.

After an excellent programme had been rendered including a dialogue, Professor Nichol, from England, gave an interesting entertainment, which was greatly enjoyed.

In concluding the entertainment the rector gave an account of the work done by the Sunday school during the year.

Yesterday afternoon the primary class had a Christmas tree and Santa Claus. The event was well attended.

DEATH OF JAMES ROBB

Well-Known Farmer of London Township Succumbs to Injury.

The death occurred at his home in London Township yesterday, of Mr. James Robb, one of the best-known and most highly respected farmers of that vicinity.

Mr. Robb, while attempting to capture a turkey about six weeks ago, fell from a high roost and sustained such injuries to his neck as finally caused his death.

Besides his wife, he is survived by three children, five brothers and seven sisters—John, of Saskatchewan; Dr. George, of Michigan; Alex., of Ilderton; Adam, of Dakota; William, of Portland, Maine; Mrs. McMurtre, of Chicago; Mrs. Henderson, London; Mrs. D. Rose and Miss Francis, of Philadelphia; Mrs. Coleman, Birr; Miss Ann, of Dakota, and Mrs. Hendricks, of Toronto.

The funeral will take place to Decker's Cemetery on Tuesday afternoon.
