VESSELS AGGREGATING 2,000,000 TONS ARE NOW NEARING COMPLETION

Britain Effectively Copes With Ravages of Submarines—18,587 Ships Arrive or Leave in Month—94 Merchant Ships, 29 Fishing Boats Destroyed.

NEW YORK, March 5.—The Associated Press carries the following: Official figures from the British admiralty made public here today at the office of the consul-general of Great Britain show that during February 24 British merchant ships were destroyed by mines or submarines. Of this number 61 ships were of 1,500 tons or over, and 33 were under 1,500 tons. In addition to the merchant ships, 29 fishing vessels of British register were sunk.

It was also reported that during the month, 67 British merchant vessels were unsuccessfully attacked by submarines, as shown by signals on the radio, admiralty up to and including March 4. The figures show that the number of merchant vessels of all nationalities, over 100 tons each and exclusive of

local or fishing craft, which arrived at and departed from British ports were as follows: Vessels arrived, 9,462; vessels sailed, 9,124. Total, 18,587. The foregoing figures do not include losses of ships of Great Britain's allies or those of neutral nations, which, the admiralty stated, are not available. Other numbers of German submarines captured or sunk, the admiralty adds, will not be made public.

Indicative of the activity of Great Britain in replacing her losses to her merchant marine occasioned by the submarines and mines, it was officially stated that at the present time more than 2,000,000 tons of shipping is on the stocks in various shipyards, all in more or less advanced stages of construction. "The general situation," the admiralty announced, "is considered quite satisfactory."

ONTARIO WEST SHORE AFFAIR GETS AIRING IN THE LEGISLATURE

Attorney-General Shifts the Blame for Escape of Moyes From Department to the People—Will Deliver Correspondence "Maybe"—Patronage Must Stay.

[Special to The Advertiser.] TORONTO, March 5.—The Ontario Government today rejected a motion by Wm. Proudfoot (Centre Huron) calling for the abolition of the patronage system, the creation of a civil service commission to make appointments, and promotions in the civil service by merit, for the purchase of all supplies for the public service on a business basis regardless of the political or personal affiliations of the vendors, and for purchase by tender in open competition. The motion was debated at considerable length in the Legislature, the discussion ending with the members of the Government passing an amendment congratulating themselves on the high standard maintained in connection with appointments and promotions in the civil service. The amendment also expressed the opinion that a civil service commission would prevent returned soldiers from getting Government positions.

in the press every day. Moyes could have been arrested long before he left. Mr. Proudfoot denied that he had brought the matter up to gain political capital.

Foy Had Explained. A. H. Musgrave (North Huron) said the township of Ashfield was in his constituency and at the last election this Moyes' affair was a burning question. It was one of the most difficult points he had to meet, why Moyes had not been arrested, and all the political capital that could be made was made. He, however, got a statement from Hon. Mr. Foy, and that proved satisfactory to the people in that part of the riding.

Hon. Mr. Lucas said the first notification they had from Mr. Proudfoot was on May 3, 1914, while Moyes, it was said, left on May 1. The attorney-general's department was asked not to arrest Moyes until the railway board made its report, which report was issued on the 11th of May. Inspector Boyd was at once placed on the job, and Moyes, having been supposed to have gone to Algonquin Park, the inspector was told off to try and locate him there, while the Toronto police kept his house in Toronto under observation.

Mr. Proudfoot, with reference to the statement that the request was made not to arrest Moyes until after the railway board's report, stated that personally he wanted him to be arrested, but there were three solicitors and they did not agree.

CANADIANS RUSH POSITION OF FOE ON ELEVATED LAND

Advance in Waves Behind Clouds of Gas.

TORONTO, March 5.—The special correspondent of the Evening Telegram at London cabled today as follows:

Once again, after months of routine warfare, the heaviest for them since the Somme offensive, though very local in extent, for in this latest "strafe" against the Germans several battalions only from one of the Canadian divisions were engaged. The attack took place on Thursday. To assist in the general forward movement the British troops have been making of late over ground abandoned by the Huns in their retreat, the Canadians launched a strong assault against a particularly formidable German position on high ground, well fortified and heavily manned by the enemy.

Advance in Waves. After vigorous bombardment of the Hun position by artillery, the Canadians moved on gas, following up with an infantry assault in waves, and, owing to unfavorable atmospheric conditions (it has been damp and foggy) and the uncertainty of the wind, the gas

clouds were not as effective as usual. The Germans met our advance with a heavy fire, but the Canadians inflicted severe losses upon the enemy before returning to their trenches.

Our artillery did particularly heavy work.

CAPTAIN OF U.S. SHIP DOES NOT OBEY SUB

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., March 5.—In addition to demanding four barrels of cylinder oil, the German submarine commander who fired on the American steamer Westwego, off Fastnet, on January 31, ordered the Westwego's captain to dump his entire \$1,000,000 oil cargo aboard or take the consequences.

According to the story of the incident told here today by Capt. McCoy.

The captain said that after securing the cylinder oil and delivering an ultimatum calling for the destruction of the remainder of the cargo before the following morning, the submarine commander returned to his vessel, submerged, and was not seen again. Meanwhile the Westwego proceeded on her way.

Capt. McCoy confirmed the previous story that the submarine, the U-45, fired five shots at the Westwego before boarding her. None of them hit.
