VOICE OF THE PEOPLE
LET FARMER AND CONSUMER WRITE.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:
The present Government in connection with the supply of pork. We are advised to produce more hogs. Now are we farmers safe in following this advice under the present tariff? No doubt the powers that be (whether the Government or moneyed interests) are responsible for the shortage to a large extent. The farmers too often have been an easy mark, but a great many of them are getting tired of being bit.

We believe that before farmers will try the greater production any further, we want a man at the head of affairs who is not so closely allied to the big interests that he cannot act without their sanction. We also know where to look for our champion, to a man who has always held the welfare of the people first. This is Canada's grand old statesman, who, in his manifesto, has certainly offered everyone security and no favoritism. Sir Wilfrid promises to cut profiteering. So it is to the honorable advantage to unite with farmers to use their opportunity to place hogs in control. Then we will raise hogs and everything else needed, to the best of our ability, knowing that if we see any, our loss will not go to stuff already too fat hogs, but for the benefit of the nation.

SOLDIERS CHEER COLES AS HOP PIT TORY TANK UT OF ACTION

Veterans Rise as One Man to Select Him as Their Candidate at Convention Held Last Evening.

Coles in accepting the nomination expressed his thanks and stated that the veterans would go into the contest plainheartedly and that he was out and that he can work it. He will make some of these men sit up. Play fair. Put your hearts and souls into the thing and we'll make a grand show next December. This is no time for regrets. We are in the field and we are going to win. There is no position that I want down there (Ottawa). The men had listened to the last remarks in answer to an insinuation made by Allan Towe that he would make a good senator.

Must Fight Machine.
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Not Going Back.
"This is a regular Jack of all trades is thrown into us now. 'The load of the Conservative convention was too much for them. They are going to dump it onto Major Cronyn.' A politician told me yesterday that the soldiers entering the party were a splendid thing to the win-the-war candidate. (Thunderous applause.)

"Who sent you here?" asked Col. Coles, after the insinuation had been handed out.

"Nobody. I just came here to hear what I have a vote, and I Mr. Towe before speaking to the soldiers' meeting last night, it's a first public speech. For a man who had never opened his mouth in public before he did remarkably well."

Want Coles Out.
"Suggested that Col. Coles should be a senator because I believe that his sacrifice in going to the front entitled him to it. I think that if Major Cronyn would support the soldier's platform there would be no sense in running another candidate. It's a serious thing running a candidate until you hear what he has to say."

"Tell me who gave you the idea," asked Col. Coles.

Real Solicitous.
"I would like to see you senator," replied Mr. Towe.

"Maybe you would like to see me king of England," replied the president of the Hermitas.

"Pretty quick work." "Do we look simple?" were the cries from the soldiers.

"I want to tell you comrades here and now that some time ago my name was mentioned for the senatorship of the city of London, but there was a split in the party, and it did not go through," said the nominee. "Maybe the party thinks I am sore over it. I am not. I am the soldier's candidate, and I'm going to win."

Major Ingram told the meeting that he had seen Major Cronyn an hour before the meeting. He said that he was by the press when it stated that he would do nothing without the insinuation of the soldiers.

On the Map.
Major Osborne declared that party and creed should be dead in the coming election. There should be no Roman Catholics or Protestants, but Britons. He was well known to the British Empire. "As a Black Knight of Ireland, I am proud to be here tonight on the same platform with Col. Coles, declared the provost marshal amid thunderous applause."
