Snyder of Toronto, and secretary of the Ontario Lord's Day Alliance, scathingly denounced the decision given recently in a case of an alleged breach of the Lord's Day act by an Elgin County milk firm, when the decision was given against the prosecution. Mr. Snyder's statement was made in the course of a sermon at the Askin Street Methodist Church on Sunday morning.

The speaker outlined during his sermon, the work carried on in Ontario by the Lord's Day Alliance. He dealt with breaches of the law and cited cases where the Lord's Day Alliance had instituted prosecution with success. He stated that the Liberty League was a direct offshoot of the opposition to the Lord's Day Alliance created in Windsor, to further the introduction of American Sunday papers to Canada, or, in his opinion, to combat the law.

Continuing, the speaker asserted that the present Liberty League was in opposition to prohibition. In citing the Elgin County milk case he said that the case came before the county magistrate about 2 p.m. After the prosecution had taken up three hours court adjourned for one hour, after which more prosecuting evidence was heard.


