

250 BOYS TO CAMP OUT AT FISHER'S GLEN

Excellent Instructors in All
Lines of Boys' Work Will
Be in Charge.

The arrangements for the co-operative camp of the churches and the Y. M. C. A. boys of Western Ontario at Fisher's Glen from July 5 to 17, are now completed. George Copeland, who was to be in charge of the Cadet Camp of the W. O. R., will take charge of the cadet work and drilling, owing to the fact that the cadet camp being postponed.

Two hundred and fifty boys from churches and "Y's" in Western Ontario will camp for two weeks on one of the most picturesque spots along Lake Erie. The camp will be located at Fisher's Glen, which is run by Dunn Bros. and Wilson. These people also have a hotel near the camp, which is said to be one of the best along Lake Erie. The reservations for rooms for the relatives of the campers should be made as soon as possible. The rates are reasonable, and they will have provisions for sale to those wishing to camp out. The camp is situated nine miles from Port Dover, and right in the centre of the trout and bass fishing of Lake Erie. The best bass grounds of Ontario are four miles away. Victoria is the closest railroad station. It is situated three miles from the camp, and a bus runs from the station whenever a train arrives.

In connection with the sports and the general program of the campers, some C. S. E. tests will be run off for the Tuxis and Trail Ranger boys. Each tent of seven boys will be under the supervision of an adult. Camp craft, nature study, athletic tests and many other games will provide amusement for the boys. Lieut. Morris, crack scout of Canada, and winner of the Biscuit trials for four consecutive years, will give exhibitions and instructions to the boys during the camping period.

LIVE STOCK COMPETITION

Will Be Held at Western Fair for Farmers' Sons.

A live stock judging competition will be held at the Western Fair this year under the supervision of the Ontario Department of Agriculture, and it will be open to farmers or farmers' sons under 25 years of age. Graduates of an agricultural college will not be eligible, and the judges for the competition will be supplied by the agricultural department.

Contestants will be permitted to enter in not more than two classes of live stock, and they will be allowed twenty minutes for placing each class and writing reasons. Oral reasons will also be given. Entries must be made and forwarded to the manager, Western Fair Association, not later than September 8, and the competition will open at 9:30 a.m. Wednesday, September 15, when sheep will be judged. At 10:30 a.m. heavy horses will be judged, and at 2:30 p.m. judging of beef cattle will be made. Money prizes in each class will be given, and an entrance fee of 50 cents per contestant will be charged.

Men and Boys Kill Songsters Sunday Near C. P. R. Bridge.

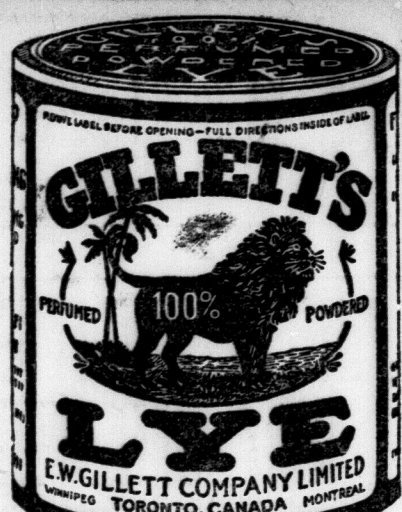

Makes Repairs To Fire Hose
