

COMES TO NAVIGATE NIAGARA'S RAPIDS.

NEW YORK, June 25 .- Vassily Rebikoff, an inventor of note in Russia, arrived here yesterday aboard the Oceanic, of the White Star Line, from Southampton, in advance of his new hydroplane, with which he expects to navigate the Whirlpool Rapids of the Niagara River.

The vessel with which he expects to perform a feat that has never been accomplished by a boat, is of 12 horsepower, driven by gasoline explosions, and is 12 feet long and three feet beam. At its highest speed of 32 miles an hour it is said to draw but three-quarters of an inch of water. At no time while moving, according to the inventor, does more than seven inches of the boat's bottom touch the water. The boat will arrive here on the Lorraine, of the French Line, from Havre next week.

With Baron von Korwin of the Austrian army, who met him when the Oceanic docked, he will go to Albany. The boat will be taken with them and transported overland to Niagara, where the attempt will be made to navigate the swirling river from the Falls to Lake Ontario. Baron von Korwin is an aeronaut of distinction, but is just now devoting himself to the boat invented by Mr. Rebikoff.
