KING'S BIRTHDAY HONORS BRING SELECTED REWARDS TO A CANADIAN QUARTET

Sir Charles Fitzpatrick Becomes a Privy Councillor, the Highest Promotion in British Legal World—Justice Falconbridge is Knighted.

KING'S BIRTHDAY HONORS. Privy Councillor—Sir Chas. Fitzpatrick, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Canada.

LONDON, June 25.—(C.A.P.)—In the birthday honours announced to-day Sir Charles Fitzpatrick is made a privy councillor.

Chief Justice Falconbridge of Toronto and Justice Taschereau of Montreal are made knights bachelor and W. F. King of Ottawa, Dominion astronomer, becomes a knight.

With the possible exception of the Order of Merit instituted by the present King in 1902 as a special distinction for men eminent in war, science, literature and art, no honours are more greatly valued than a call to the privy council.

Sir Charles Fitzpatrick is still comparatively a young man, born in 1852, and a native of Quebec City, and possessing a long record of legal and political achievement.

William Glenholme Falconbridge, chief justice of the King's Bench for Ontario, was born at Drummondville, 1846. His father, J. K. Falconbridge, was a native of the North of Ireland.

Henri Thomas Taschereau was born in Quebec and belongs to one of the oldest French-Canadian families. He was educated at the Quebec Seminary and Laval University in Montreal.

William Frederick King was born in Stowmarket, Suffolk, England, in 1854, and came to Canada in 1882. He was educated at the Port Hope Grammar School and the University of Toronto.

NIAGARA CAMP, June 25.—(Special.)—In a pitched battle, which started with the first peep of dawn, and made the hills of the Queenston Mountain ridge tremble with thunderous reverberations for five solid hours, Col. Cruikshank's "Red" army carried the day against the redoubtable Col. Mason and his "Blue" force to-day.

COMES TO NAVIGATE NIAGARA'S RAPIDS.

NEW YORK, June 25.—Vasily Rebkoff, an inventor of note in Russia, arrived here yesterday aboard the Oceanic, of the White Star Line, from Southampton, in advance of his new hydroplane, with which he expects to navigate the Whirlpool Rapids of the Niagara River.

The vessel with which he expects to perform a feat that has never been accomplished by a boat, is of 12 horsepower, driven by gasoline explosions, and is 12 feet long and three feet beam.

With Baron von Korwin of the Austrian army, who met him when the Oceanic docked, he will go to Albany. The boat will be taken with them and transported overland to Niagara, where the attempt will be made to navigate the swirling river from the Falls to Lake Ontario.
