

The Dominion of Canada will overcome these difficulties. When the provincial treasuries begin to be empty, when no more subsidies of \$20 million go to the provinces they will either have to tax or they have to come hollering to the Minister of Finance. To say that for a province to make an arrangement to rent its taxation rights to the mother parliament is an infringement of autonomy is misrepresenting the situation. Seven provinces have signed an accord, and they are satisfied. Does that say that they are not patriotic, and they do not want their autonomy just as much as the other provinces? It will have a bad effect. I do not want to play politics with the proposition.

I rose to speak tonight on another matter. The hon. member for Peace River (Mr. Low) said to me that I was wearing my pants thin. I could not understand him at that moment, but when I read over *Hansard* today I could follow the proposition. I do not think he will ever make that remark again. I am susceptible to invitations.

If I could say in words what I have in thought about that speech which the hon. member for Wetaskiwin (Mr. Jaques) made yesterday in this house, I think everybody in the house might agree with me, but I think it would make history in the Canadian parliament. I have not too much time left, but as a preface, I have never heard anything more insulting to Canada. I have never heard anything so psychopathic. I never heard any such crackpot philosophy, such a half-wit and nit-wit ideology as I heard here yesterday. I have *Hansard* here, and if you, sir, would allow me the time I would analyse that speech from page one to the last letter. I would analyse it from page 3086 to the last page in *Hansard* of May 14 where the hon. member who spoke yesterday is reported. Here is a man who consorts with the greatest enemy of the British empire. Here is a man who is consorting with the former Ku Klux Klan. Here is a man, Smith, who has been declared anti-British and anti-semitic, who has hindered Britain to the utmost degree and the hon. member for Wetaskiwin says "I have gone to the United States to convert the Americans," and that he succeeded. After listening to the hon. member, I would say the only thing he can do by his speeches is to repel anybody who listened to him. There is not any coherence in what he said. He knows nothing at all about the people he spoke about. He misled and misrepresented the house in that statement. He is a propagandist for which Canada has given hundreds of thousands of young lives and billions of dollars in wealth. I

do not think Canada wants that type. He objects to being called a Hitler. It is a compliment to him. I think Hitler had a little more brains. What he is looking for is publicity.

I have this copy of *Hansard* all marked up, and if I had the time I should like to go down the line to show you the contradictions, the inventions that this man has brought into this house, a man who has been consorting with the enemies of this country, but who says that he is a Canadian and a Christian. I wonder where he got that appointment as a Christian apostle. I know something about this Christianity. I am no foreigner to it. We have contributed to that Christianity. There is nothing in it which is not in Judaism. I admire the leader of the Social Credit party. I think he is a fine and genial person. In fact, I congratulate him on his first name, Solon, it being that of the great Greek law-giver. I was hoping that he would live up to that name and not live down to his second name, Low. When he denied any association with Smith for his party, I admired him for it. But I am surprised that the hon. member who spoke yesterday was not read out of the Social Credit party. He is a menace to the country, and we are not ready to spend another one hundred thousand lives and billions of dollars to devastate half the world.

Mr. LOW: If the hon. member will show me where he is a menace to the country, we will have him read out of the party.

Mr. HARTT: I have not the time.

Mr. LOW: Oh, you waited until five minutes to eleven o'clock before mentioning this.

Mr. HARTT: I am willing to sit down with my hon. friend. I have great confidence in him, and I am willing to sit down and show him that his colleagues are singing the song and the dirges of misery that were sung in the countries which are now completely exhausted and devastated, and whose people were fed on the blood of others, people who feed on human lives.

Mr. POULIOT: Do not discuss it with the leader of the Social Credit party alone. Let us listen to the argument.

Mr. LOW: That is the idea.

Mr. HARTT: Let us begin at the beginning, if you will allow me to do so. The hon. member for Wetaskiwin rose and said that he intended to speak on the budget, but because he visited the United States and visited the united nations he had of necessity to change
