

GOX DENOUNCES DEBT PLAN OF UNITED STATES

1920 Presidential Candidate Says Policy Will Breed III-Will

NEW YORK, Sept. 16-James M. Cox, who campaigned in 1920 for a chance to carry on the policies of Woodrow Wilson, has followed the example of Newton D. Baker, Wilson's Secretary of War, in denouncing Republican debt policy as productive of European ill-will for the United States. The 1920 Democratic presidential candidate does not go as far as Mr. Baker, who recently urged debt can-cellation as a means of reclaiming European friendship, but he does believe in more moderate terms.

After fighting "to save the soul of civilization," said Mr. Cox upon his return on the liner Majestic from European visit of several weeks, "we new insist on filing a mortgage on SAYS U. S. HATED.

"In 1920," he declared, "The United States occupied a position never before attained by any other in all history. No nation was more respected. Today none is more hated. It can hardly be just a coincidence that the present feeling is the same wherever you go.
There is a basic reason for it. With
the war ended, we recognized neither our opportunity nor duty to assume moral co-operation in peace. "Instead of seeking to ascertain what other nations should pay in fair and equitable consideration of the circum-stances of the war, we ask what they can pay by combining the assets of the present and the prospects of the fu-ture. 
