PERMISSION TO CLEAR WITHHOLD

Instructions Re Motor Ship Beatrice Awaited at Customs Here

Water Front Story Says Difficulty Has to Do With Liquor on Board.

Clearance papers for the motor ship Beatrice have been held up by the local customs authorities pending instructions from Ottawa regarding this vessel. Application was made today to clear this vessel for Lunenburg but it was said Collector C. B. Lockhart was awaiting final word from headquarters. Matters arising out of liquor said to be on board the vessel are alleged to be the cause of the delay.

According to a waterfront story the Beatrice arrived here about two weeks ago from sea and it was thought the liquor she had on board was the same as shipped from this port some time ago on a schooner cleared in the West Indies. It was alleged that this liquor was transferred at sea for some reason although why the ship came to this port or why she is clearing for Lunenburg remained a mystery.

Since this liquor arrived in Saint John in transit from Europe to the West Indies the customs authorities decided to investigate and forwarded a report to Ottawa. Meanwhile a guard was placed on board the vessel for immediate instructions but other than to hold the vessel has been received the Beatrice will not be able to sail until the matter has been settled.

Collector Lockhart refused to confirm or deny the story when asked about this matter this morning. He admitted that the vessel was being held here and that he had telegraphed for immediate instructions but pending a decision from Ottawa he said he would not give out definite information.

The Beatrice is a motor ship of 200 tons net register and is owned here on July 2 from sea in charge of Captain Torrie.

The pennant awarded daily to the best kept tent is keenly contested honor. The diamond is a favorite place until the whistle blows for bathing.

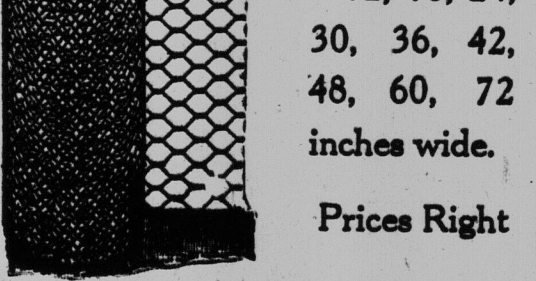
