

TRADING QUIET AT MONTREAL EXCHANGE TODAY

Industrial Alcohol and Brazilian Only Stocks to Receive Attention

CONFLICT DEVELOPS IN WALL STREET MARKET

Buying Orders Lift Some Issues, While Selling Pressure Has Effect

Canadian Press. MONTREAL, Nov. 19.—Trading was again quiet at the opening of today's stock market, with Industrial Alcohol and Brazilian the only leaders to attract more than small attention. The former was off 1/4 at 17 1/2, while the latter gained a similar fraction to 75 1/2. The strong spot was Consolidated Smelters, which advanced 1/2 to 152. Asbestos, Dominion Glass and Winnipeg Itals were all easier at 90 1/2, off 1/2, at 101, off 1/4 and at 48 1/2, off 1/2, respectively. Asbestos pfd. sold the same at 116, as did also Howard Smith.

\$13,000,000 DEAL IN RUBBER MERGER

Dunlop Tire Co. Buys 90 Per Cent. Interest in Charles McIntosh Co.

Y., Nov. 18.—A \$13,000,000 deal, interest in the Charles McIntosh Company, and all its subsidiaries, has been purchased by the Dunlop Tire and Rubber Company of America, according to London cable advices here. The transaction, involving a \$13,000,000 deal, practically merges the first and second largest rubber companies in Great Britain.

50 Cent Increase In Dividend Rate

Canadian Press. NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—Directors of the Calumet and Arizona Mining Company yesterday increased the quarterly dividend rate to \$1.50 a share, payable December 21, to holders of record December 4. This is a 50 cent increase over the previous quarterly rate.

Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—The market should have some rally today on account of the unchanged bank rate in London, which indicates no change here. So far as the stock market goes, however, it probably would be better if the rate were advanced and sent the market a little higher. The possibility of such action is much more potent in a market of this kind than the actual realization. Towards the close yesterday stocks were somewhat stronger as the result of support appearing in Steel Common just above the resistance point of 123. Stocks should have a good rally from this point, although we thought they should rally yesterday also.

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—Brook Maloney "Some bulls are being bought on the idea that they are relatively cheaper than industrials, and with the approach of winter, following the Nickel and Steel price advance, they will prove more popular purchases."

CHICAGO, Nov. 19.—"We view the money position involved in the federal reserve action as a factor that will be much over-estimated in the stock market. Hornblower—"Existing bullish factors as they apply to oil and rails are entirely brought into question by the importance until the readjustment of speculative positions has proceeded further than is now the case, but they are likely to prevent anything more than normal fluctuations while it is certain that these groups will show the greatest response to buying operations."

Politics Wreck Home, Says Jersey Banker

RENO, Nev., Nov. 18.—Too much politics broke up the home of Edward F. Feickert, president of the State Trust Company of Plainfield, N. J., the banker testified in the District Court here in divorce action against Mrs. Lillian E. Feickert, Republican state vice-chairman of New Jersey and president of the New Jersey League of Women's Republican Clubs. The suit went to trial by default, Mrs. Feickert having failed to make an appearance.

Feickert testified that after his wife entered the suffrage fight in New Jersey in 1910 he had no further home life. She promised to give up politics as soon as suffrage won, he said, but when New Jersey gave the women the vote his wife went in for partisan politics. He said that on one occasion his wife intimated that she cared more for public life than she did for him.
