IN THE MARKET.
In the city market, this morning, some cases turkeys were quoted at 70c and 75c, while in other places they were sold as low as 65c. The price of eggs also ranged from 75c to \$1 a dozen. Ducks and geese were quoted at 60c and 65c, chickens at 40c and 50c, and fowl at 30c and 40c. Other prices were as follows: Beef, 18c to 35c; lamb, 20c to 40c; pork, 40c; ham and bacon, 45c; butter, 60c to 65c; potatoes, 80c; turnips, 25c; parsnips, 60c; carrots, 55c; beets, 35c; apples, 80c to 90c; a peck; cranberries, 20c a quart; cabbage, 5c; onions, 4c a pound; celery, 10c; lettuce, 10c; and parsley and mint, 4c. Pigeons were selling at 40c a pair, and rabbits at 45c a pair.

BASEBALL PENNANT.
A magnificent large pennant has been received by Emerson & Fisher, Ltd., from the J. H. Beach Company of Philadelphia, manufacturers of the official American League baseball and sporting goods. It was presented by Emerson & Fisher, Ltd., through the efforts of Harry C. Chase, head of their sporting goods department, to the team winning the City League championship. As St. Peter's won the league Mr. Chase was able to have the pennant made in their colors, green and white. It is twelve feet long and has "Champions" in large green letters, surrounded by white and set off with a deep border of green. It is the first time that a pennant has ever been given to an amateur team in eastern Canada, and so far as is known in any part of America, by the Beach people. The pennant is at present on display in the firm's window, Germain street, and will in the near future be turned over to St. Peter's club.

DEATH OF MISS LOUISE M. HOLLY

Particularly sad was the death of Miss Louise Moore Holly, only child of Mr. and Mrs. A. B. Holly, 200 Douglas avenue, at noon today in the General Public Hospital. Miss Holly had been ill but a short time and her death at this season is especially sad. She was twenty-four years of age, of a bright and happy disposition and enjoyed great popularity among a wide circle of friends. Her death followed an operation for appendicitis. THE \$65,000 COVERS
In last evening's Times Mayor Selton field is reported as saying that the proposed subway at Douglas avenue was estimated to cost \$65,000. In R. H. Cash's letter of Dec. 18 to the mayor, the \$65,000 covers the whole cost of raising the bridge, grading the track and completing the subway. This is a very great difference.

COST THE AUTO MEN MORE THIS YEAR FOR TAGS

The issuing of the 1921 licenses for motor vehicles in New Brunswick has been commenced by the provincial public works department.

The new automobile tags are similar in design to those in use for some years but there has been the customary change in colors so as to make the new tags easily distinguishable. The background of the new tags is buff color and the numbers and lettering appears in brown.

Motorists will pay more for their licenses for 1921, the rate having been advanced from eighty cents to \$1 a hundred pounds of the weight of the vehicle, while there is also some figuring to be done on the carrying capacity. Payments before new tags are issued will therefore be about 25 per cent more than the charges this year.

The number of motor vehicle licenses issued for 1920 in New Brunswick was far in excess of other years, being upwards of 11,000, divided as follows:—Automobiles, 10,442; trucks, 659; and motor cycles, 95; total 11,196.
