Archangel, Dec. 10—(By the Associated Press)—The Bolsheviki forces were repulsed with considerable losses when they launched strong attacks against the Ausso-Allied positions on the sector between the Dvina and the railroad near Narasevo on Saturday. Fighting in the snow-clad forests, the Anglo-Russian troops captured considerable booty in a counter-advance. On the Pinega sector the Russo-Americans have withdrawn to more tenable positions than the villages farther up the river, which they recently captured.

SWISS ARREST COURIER ON GERMAN MISSION

Paris, Dec. 12—(Havas Agency)—The Swiss police have arrested a courier of Stuttgart Socialist Council on his way to Zurich. In his baggage were many pamphlets, signed by Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the German Radical Socialist leader.

The courier declared that his mission was to inform the Swiss working classes of the real objects of the German revolution.

New York, Dec. 12—Recommendations for 119 styles in women's footwear which would "meet the requirements of women's apparel, as well as bring the industry back to normal conditions," were announced here last night by the council of national service of the shoe and leather industry.

Colors suggested included three shades of brown and two of grey, as well as bronze, white and black. The height of lace boots should not exceed eight and pne-half inches, it was said, while the manufacture of buttoned boots, as well as "needle" toed lasts should be discouraged.
