TEN MILLIONS A YEAR GIVEN IN PENSIONS

American Telephone and Telegraph Company's Big Project

SICK BENEFITS ALSO

No Assessments on Beneficiaries—No Distinction Made in Rank and No Pension to Be Less Than \$20 a Month—Disability Fund Provided.

New York, Nov. 13.—Ten million dollars to be distributed annually among the telephone employes the country over as the announcement of pensions, sick benefits and life insurance to the 175,000 employes of the Bell system and associated interests.

Theodore N. Vail, president of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company, has provided combined benefits for superannuation, illness, accident and death for an industrial army more than twice as large as the standing army of the United States, and the scheme for the distribution of this fund is characterized by persons conversant with the subject as the most liberal, comprehensive and ideal ever inaugurated.

This fund of \$10,000,000 will be made from year to year by annual appropriations on the part of the American Telephone and Telegraph Company and associated companies, the Western Union Telegraph Company and the Western Electric Company. The initial amount will be available on January 1 for the 175,000 employes and their families, who in their totality represent more than a quarter of a million persons.

None of the employes is expected to contribute any portion of this sum, which is entirely at the expense of the various companies interested. It is said that the application of these varied benefits will be strictly democratic, for the benefits of employes of every rank, providing for free change of employment from one company to another, with full credit for combined terms of service. The total yearly pay for this army of employes amounts to \$415,000,000, more than \$20,000,000 being paid out in wages by the Bell telephone system alone.

It is provided that male employes who have reached the age of sixty years and who have been twenty years or more in service, may retire at the option of the company when they are fifty-five years old, and have been twenty-five years or more in service. The pension age of women is in each case five years younger than that of men.

The amount of the pension is based automatically on years of service and amount of pay, and will be one per cent. of the average annual pay for ten years, multiplied by the number of years of service. In this manner the pension has been thirty years in the employ of any of the companies would get thirty per cent of the average salary. The pension has been receiving during his last ten years of service. No pension is to be less than \$20 a month.

In the case of accidents due to the performance of work for the company the employe is to receive for total disability full pay for thirteen weeks and half pay for the remaining period of disability up to six years. The pension is to be paid by illness or accident outside of regular duty, after being in service for ten years or more, and the total disability to be given by the benefit scheme the statutory provision will prevail.

Administration of the fund will be in the hands of employes' benefit committees of five, to be appointed by the board of directors of each company.

WASHINGTON WINS SUNDAY MEAL CASE IN SUPREME COURT

Conviction For Serving on Lord's Day Quashed — The Assessment of Sheriff and Deputy

(Special to Times).

Fredrickson, N. B., Nov. 13.—The cases of Sheriff Howard and Deputy Sheriff Timmins, who are seeking to have their assessment quashed on the ground that they are not residents of the city, were argued before the supreme court this morning. Mr. Bliss appeared in support of an order made by Judge Barry calling upon the city to show cause why the assessment should not be quashed. Mr. McCready contra.
