OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—Collectors of customs at Canadian frontier posts east of Manitoba will require satisfactory proof with declaration or certificate in writing from shipper or his agent that dry skims or hides, hoofs, wool or bristles or cattle, sheep or swine arriving from the United States are not produced from animals grown or slaughtered in any of the New England states. United States custom certificates may be accepted as to the origin of any of the above articles shipped in transit through the U. S. from other countries, but the customs order says nothing about sait hides. There is at present a large cargo of salted hides now on its way to Canada from England through Beston or Portland, and it is a question how they will reach their destination.

The regulations which are laid down to govern the transit in bond through Canada of baggage or rallway passengers have not been strictly enforced of late, and as a consequence authorities of customs department have been in conference with rallway people as to the best way of securing an advance for the future.

SENSIBLE AMERICAN VIEW.

(Brooklyn Eagle.)

The most recent dispatches from Europe indicate that Germany and Great Britain have determined upon joint action against Venezuela. The earlier report that Castro's note, lately transmitted to the government at Berlin, satisfactorily settled the difference between Germany and Venezuela and that its terms would be used as a basis of adjustment between Great Britain and Venezuela, turns out to have been incorrect. The note is now said to have been invented in Berlin as a temporizing dodge intended to belie the real intentions of the dictator who masquerades as the "administration" at Caracas. German and British warships have already arrived in Venezuelan ports and others are on their way thither. The joint naval demonstration will be something more than spectacular. It will be minatory, and, eventually, punitive. It will result, unless Venezuela recognizes the justice of the attitude assumed by the aliled powers, in the assumed by the aliled powers, in the assumed by the aliled powers in the seizure and temporary operation by foreign agents of the republic's entire customs service. The right of Germany and Great Britain to enforce respect for international obligations in this hemisphere cannot be reasonably questioned and the victim of the intended enforcement in this case need not be unduly commisserated. Castro is the "whole thing" in Venezuela and chastisement of his country means the punishment of him. And he deserves it.
