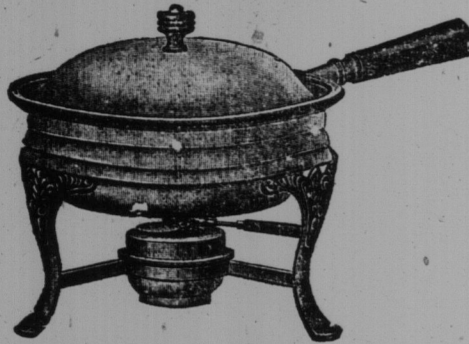

NEW HEIR TO ITALY'S THRONE. ROME, Sept. 15.-The majority of the people approve the action of King Victor Emmanuel in not choosing the title of Prince of Rome for the heir to the throne.

MUKDEN, Sept. 15 (Delayed in transmission).-According to information from Chinese sources, the Japanese are leaving garrisons at Liao Yang and their main forces are moving out on the Russian flanks.

A PORT ARTHUR FORT CARRIED BY ASSAULT.

Japs are Driving Tunnels Under the Main Defences-Both Armies in Manchuria are Being Reinforced.

CHE POO, Sept. 15, 1.30 p. m.-The Japanese troops between Sept. 8 and Sept. 10 captured a fort situated on a high hill two miles east of Golden Hill by assault.

THE foregoing information was received from an intelligent Chinese who left Port Arthur Sept. 15. He had been a dock laborer there for many years.

THE Russians have placed mines under all the public buildings, warehouses and everything that could possibly be of use to the Japanese with the intention of causing their destruction should the Japanese enter the city.

THE fort which the Japanese captured is not regarded as essential to the defence of Port Arthur, although it is obvious there will be some disadvantages from its occupation as the Japanese are constantly receiving heavy guns from Japan.
