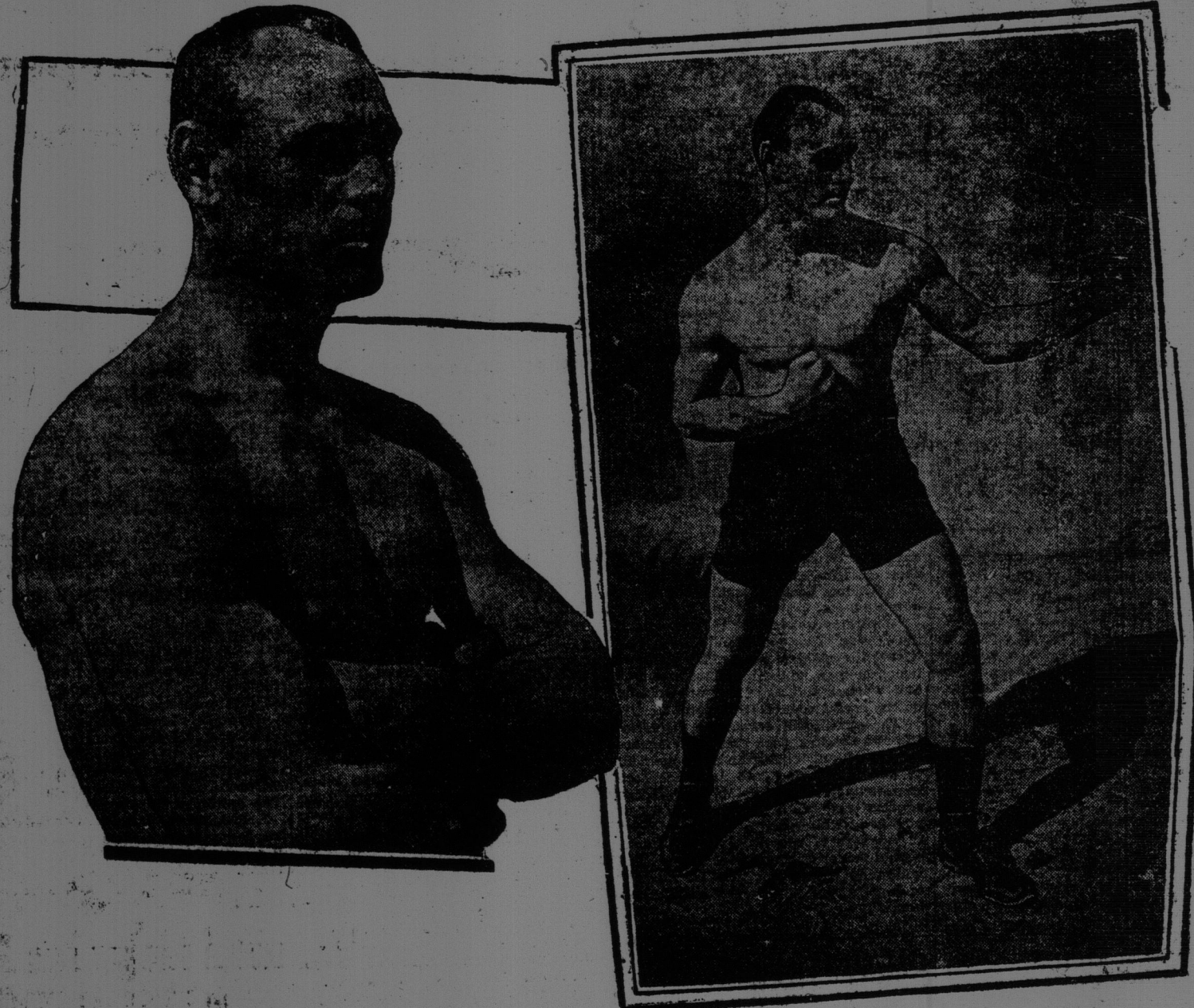


BILL SQUIRES SIGNS AGREEMENT TO MEET WINNER OF BURNS-O'BRIEN FIGHT

REGENT DEATHS. THOMAS A. TEMPLE. News has been received in St. John of the death at Norwich, Vt., on April 30, of Thomas A. Temple, formerly of St. John. Paralysis was the cause of death. Mr. Temple was born in London, England, in 1830, his father being Rev. Wm. Temple, who was sent to New Brunswick as a missionary by the Wesleyan Missionary Society. On leaving school Mr. Temple went to work with Hatchford & Brothers, who owned a shipping and commercial business on Nelson street. In 1845 he became a member of the firm of Coburn & Temple, Fredericton, but his health breaking down he removed in 1852 to New York, where he engaged in the commission business. In 1864 he came back to St. John, and established an insurance agency—fire, marine and life—in which he was very successful for some time. A few years ago he left St. John. Mr. Temple was twice married. By his first wife, Miss Annie Chestnut, of Fredericton, he had one son, Rev. W. H. G. Temple, now a clergyman at Seattle, Washington. His second wife, Miss Henrietta Devine, of Studzie, died a few years ago in California, but two sons, Edward L. and Frederick L., survive. Mr. Temple was an honorable business man and a good citizen, and many old friends in St. John will sincerely regret to hear of his death.

MRS. JANE HAWKSHAW. Mrs. Jane Eliza, widow of James Hawkshaw, died at her home, Summer Hill, Queens county, on Saturday, April 27, after about two hours' illness. Deceased had been attending her household duties as usual apparently in good health, when she became suddenly ill and quietly and quickly passed away.
