The annual meeting of the New Brunswick S. P. C. A. will be held at the Board of Trade Rooms, on Tuesday, 16th February, at eleven a. m.

The Allan liner Tumlax is due here this evening about 7.30 o'clock from Liverpool via Halifax. She brings here two saloon, twenty-five second cabin and six steerage passengers.

The Baptist ministers met in the Mission room, Prince William street, this morning. There were seven ministers present. Rev. G. Selin, Rev. D. Hutchinson, Rev. B. H. Noble and Rev. M. E. Fletcher reported that they had been holding special meetings during the past week, and are about to begin this week. The prospects for good results are promising. Rev. B. H. Noble reported that he had baptized four candidates at the close of last evening's service.

If This Were Done a Better

Class of Candidates Would

Be Secured and an Active

Opposition Developed to

Keep Check on the Admin-

istration

In order to arouse wider interest in civic affairs the Star is commencing a canvass of a number of prominent citizens to ascertain their ideas on the following question:

"What should be done to bring to the average citizen a fuller realization of his duties as a citizen and to make this realization a working force for better government?"

John Keefe, manager of the St. John branch of the James Robertson Co., Ltd., said in reply to the Star's query:

"The question of how best to arouse the interest of the citizens in local politics is a very difficult one to answer. It is hard to understand why more interest is not displayed by the average citizen when the government of the city is really such an important matter to every taxpayer. Public meetings at which the affairs of the city could be clearly presented might be useful. The newspapers devote a large amount of space to civic matters now but if more definite information regarding the position of affairs could be presented the average citizen might be led to take a deeper interest in the way the business is conducted."

"One reason why many men do not display enough zeal to run for election as aldermen is the fact that, matters that are entirely irrelevant are taken into consideration and a man may be elected or defeated on issues which have absolutely nothing to do with civic government."

"It has always been difficult to get the electors really interested in local politics. Men will grow enthusiastic over federal and provincial elections and will work for weeks for the success of certain candidates. Yet when the civic elections come around these same men hardly display enough energy to cast their votes."

"There always have been many objections expressed to bringing Dominion politics into local elections, but I believe that we might get better results by doing so. The same objections have been made to dividing on federal lines in provincial politics but I have always held that the parties should be responsible for the candidates put forward for the Provincial legislature. If the same system were adopted in the city and each party put up its candidates, I think the standard would be made higher. There are aldermen in the present council who would be hard to improve on. Others are not so desirable although some members of the present council have been elected by popular vote. But what I claim is that if the two great Dominion parties were made responsible for the candidates we would be more likely to secure a better average in the council. It would ensure an opposition which would scrutinize closely every act of the council. It is also certain that it would induce the citizens to take a livelier interest in the government of the city."
