

HEAVY SNOW STORM POLAND OBJECTS TO IN WESTERN STATES TIES UP TRAFFIC

Heaviest Storm of the Season is Sweeping Over South Dakota, Two and a Half Feet of Snow Falling up to Noon Monday.

Denver, Colo., April 7.—Trains from the north and east, entering Denver are running from one to ten hours behind schedule as a result of the wind, sleet and snow storm that swept the western States Sunday. Three feet of snow is reported at Wiggins, Colo. In Western Kansas, the Nebraska west-bound trains are experiencing difficulty because of the snow that has piled in the deep cuts. Severe weather is reported in Montana and Wyoming.

Fifteen inches of snow is reported at Cheyenne.

The heaviest snow storm of the season is sweeping over South Dakota. Two and one half feet of snow had fallen up to noon, tying up train traffic.

SIR DAVID BEATTY HAULS DOWN FLAG

On the Dispersal Yesterday of the Grand Fleet He Steps Down and Out as Commander in Chief.

London, April 7.—(Canadian Press Despatch from Reuters Limited)—On the dispersal day of the grand fleet, Vice-Admiral Sir David Beatty hauled down his flag as commander-in-chief. All the newspapers publish articles on the historic occasion, dwelling on the fact that his purpose was achieved with the complete destruction of the enemy's naval power. They pay tribute to Lord Jellicoe as the organizer and leader, and Vice-Admiral Beatty as a first class fighter, who crowned Lord Jellicoe's work.

There is some speculation whether Sir David Beatty, now unemployed, will be offered the post of first sea lord, the importance of which position, it is now pointed out, has never been greater in view of the possible effect of the league of nations upon Britain's naval policy.

It is also urged that a properly organized naval staff must never again be allowed to lapse.

PARIS METHODS

Bitterly Disappointed at the Reopening of the Danzig Question.

Paris, April 7.—Ignace Jan Paderewski, the Polish premier, declared today that the Poles were bitterly disappointed at the recent announcement of the reopening of the Danzig question, which had been regarded as settled. Telegrams from Warsaw, M. Paderewski said, showed a great anxiety over the state of affairs and a fear that serious results might follow unless the population was assured that Poland was really independent of Prussia and Germany and would have access to the sea through its own port of Danzig.

When he left Warsaw six days ago, the Polish premier added, enthusiasm for the Allies had reached a climax, as it was considered that the decision of the peace conference to give Danzig to Poland was a consummation of the dissatisfaction which existed as the result of the settlement of the boundary questions, otherwise, the population being confident that the future of free Poland was assured. However, M. Paderewski declared that the news from Paris of the reconsideration of questions which Poland considered as settled, came as a bitter disappointment.

PLEBISCITE IN ONT. ON LIQUOR MATTERS

The Date for the Vote Will be Announced Later by the Lieut.-Gov. in Council.

Toronto, Ont., April 7.—In the Legislature this afternoon Sir William Hearst announced that a plebiscite will be taken in Ontario on a date to be announced by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, upon the four questions as published last Saturday:

- 1.—Repeal of the O. T. A.
- 2.—Sale of light beer in sealed packages under Government control.
- 3.—Sale of light beer over the bar.
- 4.—Restrictive sale of spirituous liquors generally under Government control.

PREPARING DANZIG FOR ALLIED TROOPS

Several Allied Representatives There to Make Arrangements for Their Accommodation.

Zurich, April 7.—(French Wireless Service)—Several Allied representatives arrived here today to make arrangements for the accommodation of the Allied and Polish troops. A Weimar despatch to the Frankfurt Allgemeine Zeitung says that the rebirth of the German National Assembly, has postponed his visit to Vienna in order to go to Berlin to take part in the discussions on the Danzig and Polish questions.

DOMINION GOV'T RECOGNIZES VALOR

Makes Presentations to Officers and Men of Steamer Rescuing Crew of Schooner "Mildred."

Ottawa, Ont., April 7.—As a mark of recognition for their gallant conduct in rescuing the crew of the Canadian schooner Mildred, of Harbor Grace, N.S., the Canadian Government has made presentations to a number of officers and men of the steamer "British Empress," of London, England.

The rescue took place last November, under most dangerous conditions, when a series of gales, was in a sinking condition. A boat, manned by the chief officer, Mr. J. S. Robertson, the second officer, Mr. J. Dowling, and the crew of the ship's gun, Seamen J. P. Avey, S. R. Whipping and C. Moore, succeeded in taking off the crew of the wrecked schooner.

GREATER OPTIMISM PREVAILS IN FRANCE

Believe There Will be a Favorable Settlement of the Question of Her Security Against Future Aggression.

Paris, April 7.—(Havas Agency)—An extremely optimistic impression now prevails regarding the settlement of the Rhine, the question of her security against future aggression, and the neutralization of the left bank and of part of the right bank of the Rhine. This is voiced today by the Petit Journal, which in treating of the financial aspects of the settlement, says that the French Government will be completely indemnified.

The belief prevails, the newspaper adds, that Premier Clemenceau's viewpoint regarding reclamation from Germany and a special indemnity for pensions for cripples and war widows will be upheld.

CANADA TO JOIN FRANCE ASSOCIATION OF REGISTRATION

Representatives of Germany, Austro-Hungary and Turkey Have Been Expelled from the Association.

Ottawa, Ont., April 7.—Canada is to join the International Association of Registration of France, on a new basis, which will give to the Dominion the same rank in the association as that of the smaller nations such as Denmark and Rumania. On this basis Canada will be entitled to three votes in the council and for this purpose the Canadian representatives will be: John A. Ruddick, dairy commissioner; J. H. Grisdale, deputy minister of agriculture, and Joe Burgess.

Representatives of Germany, Austro-Hungary and Turkey have been expelled from the association.

SOVIET REPUBLIC IN BAVARIA
