A Saving Clause.

The saving clause in the bill is the fact that it can only go into force by proclamation of the governor. 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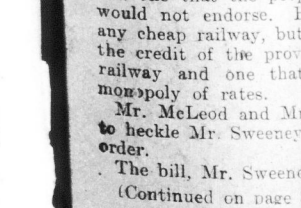
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
