## MUNICIPAL WOOD IN DEMAND

Expect to clean up before New Year.

The municipal woodpiles which a few months ago loomed up in the park at the rear of the Market building and fire hall are fast disappearing and at the present rate there will be very little of the 300 cords left at the end of the year. Reeves, Schlander who is chairman of the wood committee who has given considerable time to the sale of that wood, naturally feels elated that, in spite of adverse criticism at the beginning of the year, the \$1200 put in the estimates to cover the loss on the wood will be more than out in half. Wood to-day would be selling for a much higher price were it not for the fact that the town had wood on hand, said the Mayor.

The chairman was also of the opinion that it would be a good idea to get into communication with Mr. McConkey with a view of placing another order for delivery this winter.

## EXPECTS RINK OPEN AS USUAL

In speaking to one of the directors of the Waterloo skating rink this morning in regard to the safety of the building he said he did not think there was any occasion for alarm as he did not think there was any danger of the building collapsing. Asked further by the Record if it was the intention to open the rink as usual this winter he said as far as he knows that was the intention. He had nothing to say in regard to the action of the council in having a Provincial official inspect the building in fact he rather favored the idea of having the inspection made. One thing sure he was when the rink comes down there will be nobody in it.

## COURT OF REVISION HEAR APPEALS

The court of revision met last night, when the appeals against the assessment were disposed of. In all seven cases were stated for hearing but in only four instances were there any changes made. As far as reduced assessments were concerned. The following appeals were disposed of:— Residence of the late Dr. Bowman reduced from \$2,800 to \$2000, vacant lot of Mr. Harris, Bridgeport Road reduced from \$100 to \$50 and the lot of Mr. Jacob S. Stroh, Bridgeport Road reduced from \$300 to \$200. The appeal of Mr. W. Uffelman against income tax was allowed. There were a few changes made on the assessment roll. Dr. J. L. Livingstone being assessed in place of the Dr. Bowman estate, Miss Bella Hogg instead of Mr. John Fischer, and Snyder Desk Co., in place of Miss Hogg. W. Pletz and A. Bauer the above properties having changed hands since the assessment roll was completed. The decision of the Board means a reduction

On Tuesday evening at 6:30 o'clock the chapter will tender a banquet to all returned men the function taking place in the Assembly Hall. It promises to be an event that will be long remembered by the boys who did their duty for King and Country.

## ELECTION BILLS WAIT FOR U.F.O. SANCTION TO PAY

**\$130,000 is Total Cost of Enumeration and Voting in Toronto.**

Toronto, Nov. 4.—Over 5,000 people in the Toronto ridings are wishing that the U. F. O. would get into the saddle. There are the returning officers, the deputies, the printers, the owners of homes where polls were held, and all the other cogs in the election machinery. For the said machinery has not been off since its performance on Oct. 20. In other words, nobody has been paid.

The returning officers went with their bills to Queens Park, and they were ever so politely told not to bother the moribund government with these bills.

The moribund government decidedly did not wish to be bothered. "Just present your accounts to the U.F.O. when they take charge," was the gist of the decision.

The bill in Northwest Toronto, said to be the largest constituency in Ontario, is about \$14,000, the eight constituencies in the city will probably average \$10,000 a piece or \$80,000 in all. This is exclusive of the enumeration which possibly averaged over \$6,000 per riding or \$50,000 in all, the accounts for which have been paid. The election thus cost close to \$130,000 in this city for making the enumeration and holding the polls.

An earthquake was recorded on the north shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence but no damage has been reported.

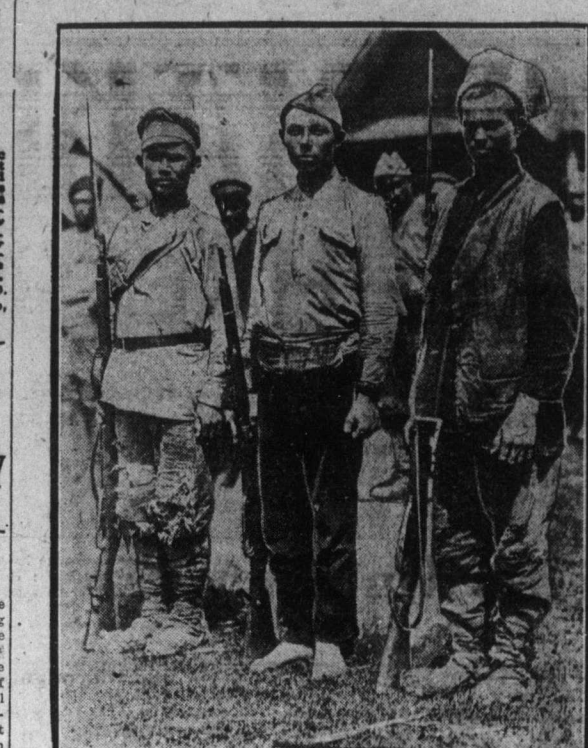

## CLAIMS LIGHTING WAS RESPONSIBLE

SO SAYS DEFENDANT ON CHARGE OF CRIMINAL NEGLIGENCE

A Sequel to Mill Street Accident on Oct. 29th

After the evidence had been heard and the same reviewed by Councils and Magistrate Weir an adjournment for eight days was made with the charge of criminal negligence preferred against Mr. Byron Bechtel of Waterloo, who was driving the automobile which collided with the buggy driven by Mr. Norman Kelly, liveryman, on the evening of October 21st, on Mill Street, Kitchener.

The Magistrate and the counsel for the Crown and the defence, Mr. D. S. Bowditch and Mr. J. C. Haight, respectively, mutually agreed to visit the place at night in order to get an idea of the effectiveness and the effect of the lights on the street near the place where the accident occurred.

In brief the prosecution's claim as crystallized in the evidence of several of the witnesses included several important statements. Among these were that the defendant who was coming from the south end of Mill Street was on the wrong side of the street; that the car was turned to the wrong side just before it hit the buggy.

Mr. Kelly, Mr. Albert Stricker, who was with him in the buggy, Dr. H. G. Lockner, Mr. W. Bowman, Mr. Louis Lauman, P. C. Kraft and Mr. E. W. Becker were Crown witnesses.

Mr. Bechtel, the defendant, who denies the charge, claimed that he had not seen the buggy approaching until it was almost up to his car; the effect of the lights on the street interfered with his vision and it was not until the two vehicles were almost up to one another that he saw the buggy; he denied he was driving on the wrong side of the road but declared that he was on the right side. When the collision occurred the two vehicles were parallel to the road. There was enough room at the side for the buggy to pass.

Mrs. Emily Martin, the defendant's sister, who had been in Donon, brought up from that village by Mr. Bechtel who had been in Galt and was returning home when the accident occurred corroborated the defendant's statement. She also denied that the motor car suddenly turned to the left just before the accident occurred.

Crown Attorney Bowditch claimed the charge had been proved.

The Magistrate in reviewing the evidence intimated that the evidence, it seemed, would warrant a conviction of criminal negligence on the part of the defendant. However, he closed his review of the same by declaring that he would not give judgement to-day but would adjourn the case for eight days.

During the course of the evidence reference was made by the Crown examining the claim that the defendant after the accident had not stopped long or given his name to the occupants of the buggy. Mr. Bechtel replied that he knew they had the number of his car and they did not ask for his name, although they were in conversation with him. Both men were quite active and did not seem to be seriously hurt. So he got into the car and proceeded on his way after having stopped and been out for some time.
