STAR THEATRE TO SHOW BIG FAIRBANKS FILM

"One of the Blood" Marks First Release of "Big Four" It is doubtful if any motion picture was ever awaited with as much interest and anticipation in Kitchener as Douglas Fairbanks' new picture "One of the Blood", which will be the attraction at the Star Theatre, beginning to-night.

GOVERNMENT WILL CALL CAUCUS ON LIQUOR BILLS

Ontario M. P.'s. Ask That New Prohibition Legislation Be Thoroughly Considered There

Ottawa, Oct. 8.—A Government caucus has been called for to-morrow morning to consider the prohibition legislation introduced in the Commons yesterday by Hon. C. J. Doherty, minister of justice. Yesterday the rules of the House were suspended in order to allow for the immediate introduction of the bills without the usual notice and it was presumed that they would be gone on with to-day. Second readings of the bills, it is learned, were not moved for, however, because of a request made by about 31 Ontario members who waited upon the Government and asked that the bills should be discussed at a party caucus before being proceeded with in the House.

THE COMPLAINT

According to reports in the corridors of Parliament to-night, exception is taken to the proposed amendment to the Canada Temperance Act, which provides that prohibition of the manufacture and importation of liquor may be brought about in any province by the carrying of a plebiscite based upon the authority of a resolution adopted by the Legislative Assembly of a province. Such plebiscite being carried, the Federal Government would issue the necessary proclamation to make it effective.

Objection of Ontario supporters to this proposal is understood to be based upon the claim that it will throw difficulties in the way of Premier Hearst in connection with the provincial election contest now in progress and have a bad effect on the referendum campaign.

MIGHT HURT O. T. A.

One member who is opposed to the legislation, said to-night that his opposition was based upon the belief that Mr. Doherty's bill would hold up to the people of Ontario the specter of bootleg prohibition and would cause many to waver in their support of the Ontario Temperance Act.

Other members are disposed to think that with the proclamation of peace which will render non-effective the wartime orders-in-council the temperance situation should be allowed to revert to the condition which prevailed before these orders came into effect.

All phases of the question will be discussed at Thursday's caucus which promises to be largely attended.

CLOTHING PRICES MAY BE FIXED

Such Action by Boare of Commerce Hinted At Toronto, Oct. 8.—Immediate and effective action to regulate clothing prices was forced by Commissioner Murdock, of the Board of Commerce, at the conclusion of the board's investigation into clothing prices here this afternoon.

THINKS PROFITS HIGHER

Commissioner Murdock said he concurred in Col. Price's declaration that there had been too much profit made by some of the clothing manufacturers whose affairs had been investigated. "And I am further of the opinion," he went on, "that there is more than net profit involved, that there is real profit to some extent hidden in certain other items that certain gentlemen have referred to in a general way as 'overhead.' I think the people of the country demand, and are entitled to a change in the situation."
