## All Contracts Must Be Carried Out

**Supreme Court Decision Makes No Difference**  
Cincinnati April 14—In a statement issued by the National Baseball Commission here today the Supreme Court of baseball announces that the decision of Judge Stafford at Washington in the suit of Baltimore Federal League Club

necessitates no modification of the system under which organized baseball is operating and advises all clubs and players that business will proceed as usual and that all legal contracts must be lived up to by the parties to them. The statement in full follows:—  
“The decision made by Justice Stafford that organized baseball violated the prohibitions of the Sherman Act was not rendered in a suit by the United States to dissolve the combination. The decision therefore, necessitates no modification of the system under which

**WAS AWAITING EXECUTION FOR MURDER**  
(Special To The Record) TORONTO, April 16.—Frank McCullough, an American youth, long execution for the murder of Detective Frank Williams, during the night. He has been apprehended.

## MCCULLOUGH SAWED IRON BARS

(Special To The Record) TORONTO, Ont., April 16.—Young American who was sentenced to death, and who was hanged on May 2, for the killing of Detective Frank Williams, from his death cell in the jail some time between eleven night and five o'clock this morning. McCullough's escape is sensational in the history of the jail. He cut away two heavy iron bars with a sharp saw, pulled through the opening, dropped on the wall which skirts the cell. He then jumped to freedom. On the way he cut McCullough left a note in a poor hand, stating that doped Curral's coffee.

Curral was arrested by Det. Bart Cronin, who was assigned case by Inspector Kennedy, and to police headquarters. Curral is that he came on duty at ten relieving Sam Falls. The day and at eleven he fell asleep after something to eat with McCullough. He did not wake up till morning. Finding McCullough and the bars cut, Curral ran alarm bell at five o'clock, and 11 guards ran to the death cell. Turnkey Henry Adley was hurried to the jail.
