

## THE OPPOSITION WILL FIGHT \$10,000,000 GIFT TO G. T. P.

Conservative Party Take the View That the Country Has Already Paid For Three Quarters of Cost of Road, and if it is to Pay For the Remainder it Should Own the Road---The Fourth Mortgage Which the Company Offers as Security For the Loan Would be Worthless---Mr. Borden Asks Government For Information Concerning the Road---The Amounts Expended and to be Expended.

Ottawa, March 12.—The Opposition caucus yesterday to determine the line of action to be pursued respecting the proposed loan of \$10,000,000 to the Grand Trunk Pacific.

Various views were expressed and there was some difference of opinion, but in the end the members were all agreed as to the proper policy to be adopted. This will be formally announced by Mr. R. L. Borden on Friday next, or whenever the Government resolution may come up for discussion. Meanwhile it may be safely said that the resolution will be fought to a finish, and that no further loan will be permitted to the Grand Trunk Pacific. If the company has broken down and can go no further, then it will be for the Government to finish the work.

We want the work upon the Grand Trunk Pacific to go on, said a prominent Conservative member to-night. "It would be ruinous to stop the work, but we do not propose to hand over \$10,000,000 to this company, whose stock is worth less upon a fourth mortgage as security."

"What is your plan?" "It is Mr. Borden's original plan. The road must be handed over to the Government. We are putting up practically all the money and we must own the road."

### Want Facts Presented.

Mr. R. L. Borden yesterday afternoon called upon the Government for information which he desired at hand before making his argument. Among the items mentioned are the following:

"The amounts actually expended to date, and the sources whence the amounts have been derived; an estimate of the total cost when completed of the mountain and prairie sections, and the amount required to complete these; of the outstanding indebtedness of the company and its available assets; the route of the railway in relation to other roads; the expenditure on rolling stock; the stock issues and proceeds and under what conditions the stock has been disposed of; how many branch lines have been financed; what the bonds have realized; all information as to prior mortgages; the total amount of fixed charges; the actual amount invested by the promoters of the undertaking, and the amount of all indirect liabilities of the people of Canada by way of guarantees."

### Old Claim Against Grand Trunk.

Replying to Mr. Geo. Taylor, in the House this afternoon, Mr. Fielding stated that the liabilities of the G. T. Railway to the Dominion of Canada had been determined by the legislation of 1862 as \$15,000,000 principal and \$10,000,000 accrued interest. This claim was taken over as an asset by the Dominion Government at Confederation, but it no longer appeared on the balance sheet. No payments had been made on this account to date.

### Squabble in the Senate.

There was a stirring scene in the Senate this afternoon, which at times bordered on the sensational. Senator Cloran was the stormy petrel, having in tow a St. Patrick's Day resolution. It was a mild resolution, prefaced by a speech of effusive loyalty. Indeed, the resolution did no more than to congratulate "our fellow citizens of Ireland" upon their improved conditions under the present reign. The sting was probably concealed in the tail of the resolution, which directed the Speaker of the Senate to transmit a copy to Mr. John E. Redmond.

Senator Dandurand, the Government leader, insisted that Mr. Cloran was out of order and the chair promptly sustained him. Mr. Cloran then moved to adjourn, in order to get a chance to finish his speech. Here the trouble commenced. Mr. Speaker Kerr put the question so quickly and declared it "lost" so emphatically that when Senator Cloran rose to speak he found himself out of order. He protested vigorously, and several Senators called upon the chair to remove

It was up to Captain Chambers, usher of the Black Rod, in knee breeches and black stockings, to perform this duty if the Speaker so decided, and every one glanced with some amusement at the startled official and the brawny Senator. It was this humorous situation that appealed to the Chamber and suddenly recalled the Senate to its accustomed good nature. It was soon arranged that Senator Cloran should let it drop for to-day and the resolution will come up on Friday. Incidentally he has modified the resolution so that now it is to be sent to Right Honorable Mr. Asquith instead of Mr. Redmond.

### Rural Mail Delivery.

Mr. Armstrong (East Lambton) made a strong speech in the House this afternoon. Commenting upon Mr. Lemieux's unsatisfactory dealings with the problem of free rural mail delivery, he showed by many citations from the addresses that the Postmaster General had always opposed the system. True, he had turned a complete somersault at Niagara Falls last September, in order to help out the elections, but Mr. Armstrong feared no less that he had no heart in this branch of the post office department. Mr. Armstrong also commented upon the fact that the Canadian farmer was held up for a \$5 box, which he must purchase from a foreign manufacturer.

Mr. Lemieux, in his defence, made no claim to be enthusiastic for rural mail delivery, but insisted that he was making a good beginning and giving it a fair trial.

Mr. Thornton, the new member from Durham, made an excellent speech, and Messrs. Blain, Henderson, Gordon, and other members of the Opposition, took part in the debate.

### Pugsley in Trouble Again.

When the House got into supplies, public works estimates were taken up instead of the postal estimates. Rivers and harbors in the Chicoutimi and Saguenay district, Quebec, furnished some startling, though not unexpected, cases of maladministration.

Hon. George E. Foster called attention to some public works at Chicoutimi. It appears that a municipal bridge was needed across the mountain river, where it empties into the Saguenay. One pier was built by the town and the other by the Dominion Government. It was charged up to "Saguenay river dredging account."

Mr. Foster characterized this misappropriation as being merely stealing, and more than intimated that the Minister was trying to evade responsibility by a false estimate to the House.

Mr. Pugsley said that the work was done before he became a Minister. He promised that no further work should be done for municipal purposes out of money voted for the department.

There was some renewed discussion as to the employment of young Girard, son of the member for Chicoutimi, to supervise important work. Mr. Pugsley admitted he had erred in stating that the young man was an engineer.
