Debates:

Rules of, from 17 to 30.

A member addresses the House and does not refer to any one by name, 17.—Sharp and personal speeches are forbidden, and Members offended appeal to the House, 18.—Offending Members apologise or incur censure, 19.—Quarrels prevented by the House, 20.

A Member can only speak to the question before the House, to an amendment, or to a point of order, 21.—And can only speak once, except in explanation, reply, or in Committee of the Whole, 22. And not after the question has been put, 28.—He may require the question to be read, 27.—Motions that are received when a question is under debate, 36.

Demeanor of Members—15.

Divisions in the House—how taken, 29, 30.

Divorce Bills:

Notices by Applicant during six months in Newspapers, 75.—Notices to be served on adverse party; or proof of the attempts made to effect the service, 76.—*Proceedings in Courts of Law* are laid before the House, 77.—Also proof that the damages, if any, have been levied, or excuse given, 78.

The Second Reading takes place fourteen days after the first; notice thereof is posted up and served with the Bill on the Adverse Party, or in default, an excuse is adduced, 79.—*The Petitioner* may be dispensed from appearing at the Bar at the second reading, 80.—*Witnesses* are heard respecting the celebration of the marriage, 81.—Are summoned at the expense of the parties requiring them, and allowed their reasonable expenses, 83.—When refusing to appear, they are taken into custody, 84.—*Counsel* on both sides may be heard at the 2nd Reading, 82.

The Drafting and Printing of the bill is at the expense of the parties; 350 copies in English and 200 in French are furnished to the Clerk;
