

Master tree program eyed

A master tree program that would include continuing maintenance for city trees has been recommended for approval by Mississauga's general committee.

The committee has adopted a report from recreation and parks commissioner Ed Halliday

that calls for setting up a full-time tree section for the first time in the parks department.

The proposed budget of \$291,000, would include funds for an aerial platform truck and a water-tank truck as well as the salaries for 14 full-time employees for the tree section.

The city will advertise soon for an arborist and a "forestry inspector" for the new department.

Mississauga spends about \$250,000 on its tree program.

"If you want a good, top-notch program, this is what you need," Halliday told the committee in response to questions about the need for

a tree section.

"We have a problem in the city now with maintenance," admitted Halliday. "The trees are planted, then forgotten."

Under a master tree program, a minimum of 3,000 trees on streets and 300 large trees in parks would be planted each year until the

three-year backlog of tree plantings is cleaned up.

Maintenance would be carried out on a continuing basis and protection given to trees near utility or construction sites.

The tree-program recommendation now goes to city council for consideration.

Tougher enforcement of game laws urged

Enforcement of game and fish laws in the Maple district (which covers Mississauga), of the ministry of natural resources has been cut back heavily since 1950, according to Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters.

In a letter to city council, Jack Hedger of the federation comments on recent criticism by some council members of enforcement problems during the run of Coho salmon up the Credit River earlier this year.

"We believe that the people of Ontario are becoming very concerned at the rape of our fish and wildlife by the 'slob element' and the poachers", the letter states. The people of Mississauga have had this problem brought to their doorstep by the lawless individuals snagging, spearing, netting and trespassing on the Credit River."

The letter requests council urge the provincial government to increase its number of conservation officers.

Councillor Caye Killaby said private land along the Credit has constantly been trespassed upon by fishermen this year.

She said the problem would probably be worse next year and urged council to endorse the federation's request for more enforcement officers. Council agreed.

In a brief to the provincial government, which was also forwarded to council, the federation claimed that hunting pressure has increased on the average at least two times since 1950; and fishing pressure has risen about two-and-a-half times. However, enforcement efforts have decreased two-and-a-half times.

"Is it any wonder that sportsmen all over the province are seriously disturbed over the apparent lack of concern shown by the government for the illegal taking of our fish and game?" the brief asks.

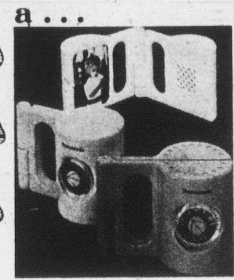
The proliferation of salmon fishing in the Credit is the result of a ministry of natural resources program to stock the fish in connection with the lamprey eel-control program for Lake Ontario. The eel almost wiped out the lake's salmon population. The ministry also hopes to encourage sport fishing.

Lack of parking facilities and the necessity to cross private property to reach the Credit in many locations has caused serious problems.

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority will also be examining ways of controlling salmon fishing.

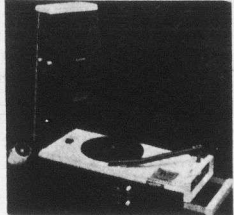

They attempted to persuade him to put the knives down, but he refused.

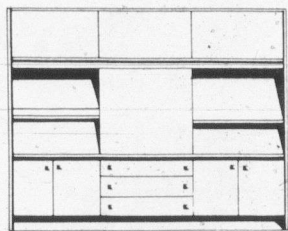
The detectives grabbed the man and subdued him after a brief struggle. He was arrested under the Mental Health Act and subsequently charged with possession of a dangerous weapon.

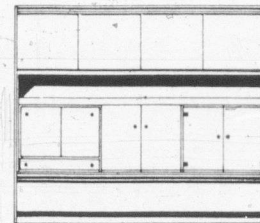

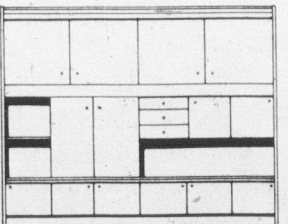

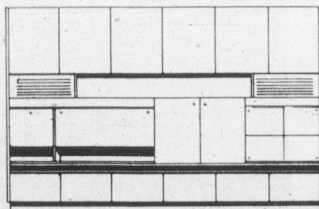

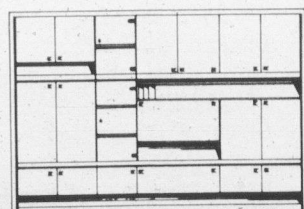

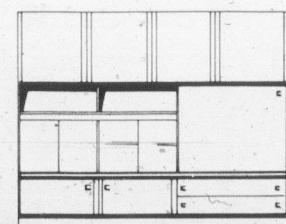
