

Shipway quits Builders lose

Missed opportunities in lacrosse are like lottery tickets after the draw — close, but not close enough.

Just as the ticket buyer can't help but think of what he could have done, with the million dollars, Mississauga Builders couldn't help but realize that a few cashed-in opportunities would have been good for a victory over Peterborough Friday night at Huron Park Arena.

Peterborough survived with a 16-15 victory over Builders, who were playing with general manager Jim Halliday behind the bench. Coach Ray Shipway quit the team Wednesday night following an argument with goaltender Bob Neeb during a game against Brampton.

Shipway had come under fire from some players and executive for his criticism of players. Shipway was also saddled with a great deal of work not ordinarily falling under a coach's list of duties.

"Nobody minds criticism if they're not playing well," said Neeb. "But he (Shipway) was giving criticism without saying what we could do to change what we were doing wrong. I think it's going to be a lot more fun now."

Builders blew a 9-5 first period lead over Brampton and lost 18-17 Wednesday night.

In Friday's game, Gil Dupre had a shot at an open net with two seconds remaining to play but his stick was hit by a Peterborough player and the shot sailed over the net.

Earlier in the third period, Stu Aird and

Randy Dupre failed to take advantage of a two-on-one break and Mike McMillan saw two shots from close range blocked by the Peterborough goaltender.

Builders had a power play mid-way through the third period but the Gray-Munros controlled the ball for all but 10 seconds of the infraction time.

McMillan led scorers

with four goals, Gil Dupre had three and Murray Barrick and Brian Hall had a pair of goals each.

Aird led the scoring against Brampton with four goals.

Mississauga hosts Peterborough tonight at 8:00 at Huron Park and travels to Rexdale Friday. Tuesday night, Builders return to Peterborough.

Fights will almost cer-

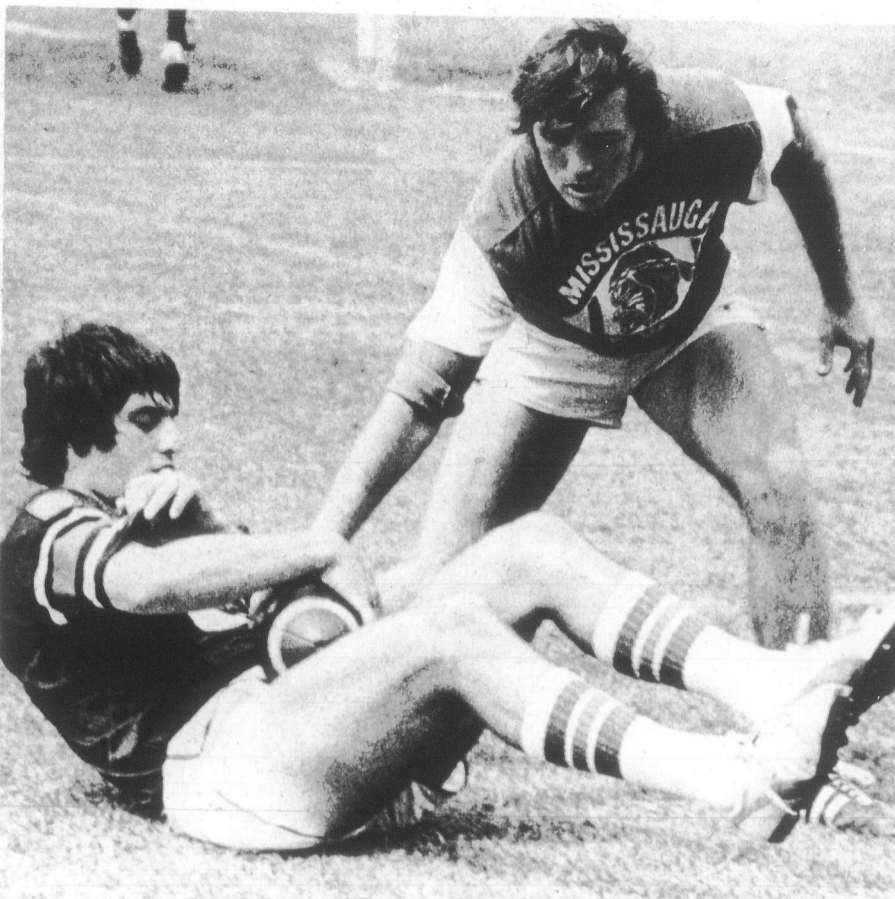

Fame forever to volunteers

Two Mississaugans were honored for dedicated service to minor hockey with induction into the Mississauga Hockey Hall of Fame last week.

Long-time Dixie-Burnhamthorpe registrar Graham Hunt, who passed away in 1977, and one of the pioneers of the national coaching development program, Bill Corner, were elected by a special committee comprised largely of former Mississauga Hockey League presidents.

Hunt served 10 consecutive years as registrar, a job requiring a great dedication of time, for the Dixie-Burnhamthorpe hockey organization. It is estimated that he registered between 15-20 percent of the boys in his own home.

Corner has served as treasurer, vice-president and president for both the Port Credit Hockey Association and the MHL. He assumed the position midway through the 1972-73 season when Warren Marshall passed away and held the job for the following season.

Corner was among the instigators of the national coaching development program and has advocated it enthusiastically in the Mississauga area. Corner instructs coaches and remains active by playing in an old-timers league.

Corner and Hall join approximately 30 other members that have been inducted since 1965. Among them are Bill Buss, Ron Ellis, Fred Stanfield, Jack Stanfield, Gord Stanfield and Morley Peeling.

Spartan effort gets Scotched

Ernie Hill wasn't too upset that his Mississauga Spartans lost the final of the Robbie Soccer Tournament last weekend. After all, he lost to a fellow Scotman who played a Scottish style of soccer.

Spartans lost the 128-team tournament bantam final 4-3 to Clermont Soccer Club of East Kilbride, Scotland.

Sprinters set for Games trial

A healthy Lyndon Fong, a sore Cole Doty and the hot Peter Harper lead the parade of Mississauga athletes into the first Commonwealth Games track and field Saturday and Sunday in Montreal.

Eleven area athletes, most of them sprinters, will compete for spots on Canada's track team. Winners this weekend and at the second trials in Edmonton July 15-16 automatically win a spot on the national squad.

A third competitor in each event and relay-events team members will be picked by committee.

Doty, the number one ranked sprinter in Canada, has been bothered by a sore leg but will compete in at least one event at the first trials.

"His leg is still bothering him a bit," says coach Dave Hart. "He may go only in the 200 this weekend and run the 100 next weekend."

Harper, who finished second in the 400 with a personal best 47.44 at the Mexico international meet last week, hopes to grab a spot on the team with top sprinters Glenn Bogue and Brian Saunders. He must beat at least two men with faster times this season.

Fong, who excels at 200 metres, has designed his training so he will peak for the trials.

"He's peaking at the right times," says Hart. "He'll be happy with a spot on a relay team."

Also hoping to crack the team are brothers Doug, Jerry and Sterling Hinds who are all sprinters; 100-metre runner, 16-year-old Angela Bailey; 400-metre specialist Janette Wood; sprinter Ernie Halstead and thrower Jack Harkness.
