Sir,

With reference to your letter of the 28th August, in which you stated that you regretted that you were not favoured with an interview with Mr Ogilvie upon the occasion of his visit to the Blood Indian Hospital, as you thought that had you consulted together a different plan would have been prepared by the Architect, I beg to say that Mr Ogilvie's attention was drawn to the matter, and he has reported that he called at the Agency, and found that both you and Dr Edwards were absent. He says further that he left a letter with the Interpreter for you stating where he had gone (to the hospital).

It would appear from your letter that you wished to give the impression that Mr Ogilvie did not attempt to see you, and therefore ignored your position. Apparently there was no such desire on his part. The fact that he called at your office, and left a note as to his whereabouts is proof of this.
