the industrial school be enlarged and education centralized there in preference to the ostablishment of other schools. It was true that some Indians complained of the distance in sending tjoir children to Alert Bay to the School, but they would probably have the same complaint if the school were only a mile sway. There had been a day school at Kingsombe Inlet but it had had to be eleged on account of the nonattendance of the Indian children. That school had been moved about, with the missionary tensher; the school and moved about with the Indians and there was therefore no exours for the non-attendance. The Indian children at Alert Bay all attended either the Industrial School or the day school. On some of the remote reserves none of the chilren attended any schools partly on account of the distance to a school. There were but few of the pupils in the Industrial School from points outside the Agency, possibly six or seven and eight in the Girle' School, these being from other Agencies for which there were no such schools. There were two small boys that Inspector Oreen had brought in, he could not say from whom. He did not think that any of the pupils at Alert Bay were from Benaimo. As to hospitals, there was one at Alort Bay and another new one just opened at Campbell River, those being maintained by the Provincial Government and the Department of Indian Affairs making provision for the treatment thereat of Indian patients, \$1.00 per day being paid for each Indian receiving treatment. The Provincial Covernment paid \$1.00 per day for a certain number of hospital patients, the per capita allegance reducing gradually to a minimum of 60 cents a day. The Dominion Government had paid about half the cost of construction and equipment of the Alert Boy heepital, and last year had granted \$1,000 toward the establishment of the new hospital at Compbell River. this great being altogether apart from the allowance for patients treated. At Compbell River the hospital was not got in a position to receive this great incomes as a tuber-
