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EARL GREY CRITICIZED

Acted of Himself in Granting Giacomini Respite of Sentence.

Technically Within His Rights, Quebec Members of the Cabinet Protest That He Should Act Only As the Mouthpiece of the Government in Such Cases—Common Sense Make a New Record in Scanning Estimates.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—Already differences have arisen between the Dominion Government and the new Governor-General. They have their origin in the respite granted in the case of Antonio Giacomini, the Montreal Italian, whose execution was to have taken place to-day. Earl Grey acted wholly on his own responsibility in granting the respite.

While His Excellency was technically within his right in so acting, some members of the Cabinet, especially those from Quebec, are making an energetic protest. The Governor's interference, they declare, is an unwarranted assumption of authority. It is for the viceregal authority, they say, to act as the mouthpiece of the Government in such cases, and not to take the initiative, as did Earl Grey in granting a respite to Giacomini.

Measures designed to save the life of Giacomini have excited in high quarters. The Italian colony in Montreal went the length of cabling the King of Italy, praying for His Majesty's intervention. His Majesty handed the petition over to the State Department, from which it is understood representations were made to the Imperial authorities in London, and thence to Ottawa.

The respite of a week undoubtedly means that Giacomini will not go to the gallows.

IN THE COMMONS.

Recess Committee of Supply in Four Days After Opening.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—The House had its first sitting of the session yesterday afternoon. In this reaching the stage of committee of supply, just four working days after the formal opening of Parliament, the House established a record. Usually the estimates are laid on Monday, and when they do come the Opposition is not willing to take them up until the arrival of its old friend, the Auditor-General's report. This year the House proceeded to the consideration of the estimates with nothing more to guide it than its good common sense, but if the House was tolerant in being won over for a recess election in short order, it soon demonstrated the truth that it has abandoned none of its heaven-born rights to examine into details and trivialities.

Each Item Scanned.

Statutory increases in the salaries of civil servants, ranging from \$25 to \$50 per annum, figured up as the first item of the estimates. The chairman was not allowed to indulge in the generally accepted practice of voting supplies by departmental totals. He was obliged to read each individual item. Hon. W. Patterson, Minister of Customs, acting Minister of Finance, had charge of the estimates. He was pressed for information which he was able to extract from his deputy; and for other information which the dark divinity of the department have yet to divulge.

The House was in good humor, a condition which invariably facilitates the voting of His Majesty's supplies. Fair progress was made, the few contentious items encountered being held over for the House to wrestle with some day when it has more light in its heart.

Canada and Mexico.

Before the House went into Committee of Supply, Mr. Foster made enquiries regarding the steamship service between Canada and Mexico. Vis William Mulock replied that tenders from steamships were not within the appropriations voted by Canada and Mexico, \$50,000 apiece. The service contemplated was to include two lines, one on the Atlantic and one on the Pacific. New efforts are being made to organize the service, and Mexico is ready to vote another \$50,000 if Canada will do the same to start a monthly service on the Atlantic. The question of a Pacific service will be allowed to stand for the time the Government of Mexico believing that more reasonable terms can be secured.

Canada and G.T.R.

Mr. Foster also wanted to know the scope of arbitration between the Dominion Government and the Grand Trunk Railway. Between Mr. Emerson and Mr. Fitzpatrick the House was informed that arbitration is being held by mutual agreement to settle certain claims arising out of the issue of Grand Trunk lines for the purpose of extending the G.T.R. to Montreal. The terms of reference will be communicated to the House.

John Haggart asked if the Government had any part in the purchase of the Canadian Pacific Railway by the Grand Trunk. He wanted to know also if there was any arrangement whereby the Intercolonial Railway would have running rights over the Canada Atlantic. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that transaction was between the Grand Trunk and the Canada Atlantic and the Government had no part in it.

The Senate.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—Senator Wood yesterday moved for a return of reports of surveys employed on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway between Quebec and Montreal. Senator Wood said that Toronto newspapers had printed reports of surveys, giving particulars of the grades.

Senator Scott replied that the Government had no information whatever, and any reports were purely exploratory. The Government's assertion ought to be taken in place

Acclamation in First Bye-Election.

Quebec, Jan. 20.—Mr. Arthur Lachance, advocate, was nominated at noon in the Government interest for the House of Commons to fill the vacancy in Quebec Centre caused by the recent appointment of the old member, Mr. Albert Malouin, to the judiciary. Mr. Lachance's nomination papers were signed by over twelve hundred electors, and as no Opposition was offered he was declared elected by acclamation.
