Ottawa, Jan. 20 .- Already differ Ottawa, Jan. 20.—Already differences have arisen between the Dominion Government and the new Governor-General. They have their origin in the respite granted in the case of Antonio Giacconi, the Montreal Italian, whose execution was to have taken place to-day. Earl Grey acted wholly on his own responsibility in granting the resulfs.

wholly on his own responsibility in granting the respite.
While His Excellency was technically within his right in so acting, some members of the Cabinet, especially those from Quebec, are making as mergetic protest. The Governor's interference, they declare, is an unwarranted assumption of authority. It is for the vice-regal authority, it is for the vice-regal authority, they say, to act as the mouthpiece of the Government in such cases and not to take the initiative, as did Carl Grey in granting a respite to Giacconi.

Measures designed to save the life of Giacconi have been excited in high quarters. The Italian colony in Montreal went the length of cabling the King of Italy, praying for Hiss Mafesty's intervention. His Majesty handed the petition over to the State Department, from which it is understood representations were made to stood representations were made to the Imperial authorities in London and thence to Ottawa.

The respite of a week undoubtedly means that Giacconi will not go to the gallows.

#### IN THE COMMONS.

Reach Committee of Supply in Four Days
After Opening.

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—The House had its first fling at the estimates yesterday afternoon. In thus reaching the stage of committee of supply, just four working days after the format opening of Parliament, the House established a record. Usually the estimates are late in coming down, and when they do come the Opposition is not willing to take them up until the arrival of its old friend, the Auditor-General's report. This year the time honored rules, and practices were dispensed with, and the House proceeded to the consideration of the estimates with nothing more to guide it than its good common sense, but if the House was tolerant in being rushed in Committee of Supply on short notice, it soon demonstrated the truth that it has abandoned none of its heaven-born rights to examine into details and trivialities.

The question of a Pacific service will be allowed to stand for a time the Government of Mexico believing that more reasonable terms can be secured.

The terms of reference will be communicated to the House.

John Haggart asked if the Government had any part in the purchase of the Canada Atlantic Railway by the Grand Trunk. He wanted to know also it there was any arrangement whereby the Intercolonial Railway would have running rights over the Canada Atlantic. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that transaction was between the Grand Trunk and the Canada Atlantic and the Government had no part in it.

Atlantic part in it. Ottawa, Jan. 20.—Senator Wood vesterday moved for a return of reports of surveyors employed on the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway between Quebec and Moncton. Senator Wood said that Toronto newspapers had printed reports of surveys, giving particulars as for grades.
